Introducing “Family-Friendly First-Fridays”

During the past five years, we have developed a joyful, musical, engaging and participatory Shabbat experience and I am pleased to say that our Shabbat services are well-attended. A wonderful community is present each week to enter Judaism’s “palace in time,” and I fully believe that those who have made Shabbat their sanctuary at Temple Israel have deepened their lives.

After five years, I also know that there are many for whom the discipline of attending Shabbat services each week is difficult, or complicated, or perhaps not even considered. I understand this. There are obstacles. I know, for example, that the service time doesn’t meet everyone’s schedule, and I know that after a hard workweek, it is not so simple to get in the car and arrive to the temple ready to pray at 6:30 PM on Friday evening – especially for those with children.

Over the summer as we prepared for the new year, we pondered this Friday night dilemma and thought about how we could better encourage our congregants to try out Shabbat services, at least on a monthly basis. Focusing on the first Shabbat of the month and calling them “First Fridays,” at these services, we would continue to do some of the things we have always done on the first Friday night of the month: *Kol Sasson*, our youth choir would sing, we would tell a story instead of giving a sermon, and we would acknowledge and bless individuals and families with *simchas* occurring during the month ahead.

But we knew we needed something additional to distinguish the First Fridays. So, we experimented: in July we held a Sha-Bar-B-

Q after services. In August, we made our own sundaes during the Oneg Shabbat. A Middle Eastern theme, camel rides and a delicious meal helped us celebrate Sukkot in October. Each of these Shabbat events was successful in its own way, attracting a diverse population from our large congregation. And although each program was unique, there were common themes expressed by a variety of people after the programs: they were warm, family-friendly, Shabbos-dich, fun, meaningful, spiritual, community-oriented, fulfilling, and filled with lots of kids!

In light of these sentiments and successes, we will continue our experiment into the months ahead. This month, November 6 is called, “Share Shabbat Sweetness,” and we’ll have a *tzedakah* project. Following services, the Oneg will be embellished with light sandwiches for a nosh, and we’ll make chocolate buckeyes and other dipped-in-chocolate foods to give to residents of the YWCA Family Center to enjoy on the weekend of the OSU-Michigan game (see box on p. 3 for details). And in December, we’ll move our First Friday focus to the second Shabbat (December 11) to coincide with the first night of Chanukah. That night, the children will make their own Chanukah *shammes* candles at a candle-making “factory,” while adults can enjoy a leisurely Chanukah dinner prepared by the Brotherhood (see p. 7 for details about the dinner).

Our vision is that on First Fridays, our Shabbat community will grow into a very large family-oriented Erev Shabbat, with good food, a warm and loving community, and a spiritual and nourishing feeling. We’ll be tossing in some large pillows for the kids to sit on during the story.

Help us build First Fridays by coming in November, then December, and hopefully you will make it a monthly ritual into the new secular year. Oh, and by the way, your ideas for First Friday programs, *tzedakah* projects and other fun events are welcomed. We have yet to think past December!

ABOUT THE COVER: The artist who designed the Sanctuary stained glass windows is Sam Weiner, Jr., born in Shreveport Louisiana in 1928. He studied art and architecture with, among others, Josef Albers and William deKooning and graduated with a BFA in Fine Arts from Yale in 1951. After working in Paris, he opened a studio in New York City in 1955 where he realized some 80 commissions, one of which was the stained glass work he did for Temple Israel through Percival Goodman, architect for Temple Israel’s “new” building in 1959. Weiner has served on the faculties of Columbia University, Parsons School of Design

and been a guest lecturer at numerous art schools, museums and universities. In a recent email, Weiner states that the Temple Israel stained glass windows project “was my first large stained glass project from which I learned a lot since then.”

MEANING IN THE WINDOWS: At either side of the Ark, according to Weiner, the stained glass windows “represent elements with which God created the world, according to the rabbis: fire and water. The water tumbling down the stain glass work of art is the water that came from the rock when Moses struck it. The fire that leaps up from the bush in the window (behind the rabbis’ chairs) is the fire that came from the Burning Bush that was never consumed.”

ABOUT THE ARTIST: Temple member, Sandi Morton, has photographed a portion of the Sanctuary stained glass window, a portion that she finds especially appealing. “It is a familiar sight to all of us,” Sandi states. Sandi has taken the bulletin covers “under her wing” and will be producing photographic art to share with the congregation for months to come.

Religious School

November is for *Nedivut* (Generosity)

The *Middah* of the Month for November is *nedivut* (generosity). In one of our November Torah readings, we will meet Rebekah—the woman who becomes Isaac’s wife and the mother of twins Jacob and Esau. Rebekah is chosen to marry Isaac because of the generosity she shows to Abraham’s emissary.

Later in Torah, when God wants the Israelites to build a sanctuary, God asks for donations from those *yidvenu libo* (whose hearts so move them.) These voluntary gifts—which are also listed on the Ner Tamid recognition wall—allowed the Divine Presence to dwell among the Israelites. In Jewish tradition, generosity, the free-giving of what one has to those in need, is a virtue that can have material and spiritual benefits.

One of the ways our Religious School students will be asked to strengthen their *nedivut* in November is by participating in the Columbus Jewish Federation’s Children’s Campaign. This voluntary exercise in generosity will allow our students to practice the tradition of supporting the Jewish community by collecting change throughout the month. On Super Sunday, one of our students will have the opportunity to present the Federation leadership with our school’s total collection.

The Columbus Jewish Federation continues to provide generous support for our school and congregation in a variety of ways. Building *nedivut* by participating in the Children’s Campaign in November will be our students’ chance to give back. While parents and grandparents are welcome to encourage or even supplement the Children’s Campaign, this month, please consider the benefits your own *nedivut* might bring you and our community.

The President's Message

This is the message President, Ted Smiley, delivered to the Congregation on Rosh Hashanah morning.

Shabbat Shalom and *L'Shana Tova*.

My name is Ted Smiley, the President of Temple Israel. I'd like to begin by thanking all of you who gave me your moral support and critical input for this, my first High Holiday President's address.

To my wife, who suggested I ask someone - anyone - who was not me to give this speech, and that we should begin a new tradition for my two years as President - the "Anyone but the President's" High Holiday Address.

To my children who, when I complained that the speech might be too long, replied, "please read fast."

It has been five months since I was installed as your President. Those past months have been filled with many *simchas*, but also a few sorrows. In these months, we lost, to death, many congregants and congregant's family members. Their loss is painful, but their memory is strong. Our task, as a congregation, is to cherish their memory and to build on their good deeds with good deeds of our own, not for them and not for us, but for our children our grandchildren and those who have yet to be born.

I'm happy and pleased that your Board of Trustees is dedicated to this end. We are continuing the work of our past leaders to make Temple Israel healthy and strong. One example of this strength is our financial strength. I am pleased to report that for the first time in quite a few years, we have presented a balance budget. We achieved this without requesting dues or Religious School fee increases. Significantly decreasing our mortgage debt through your generous pledges and payments to the *Ner Tamid* Campaign is one contributing factor. Our previous \$1.7 million mortgage now stands at \$575,000. We are saving almost \$100,000 per year in interest on the debt. Our hope and expectation is that the remaining debt will be paid off by the end of this fiscal year. Although the formal campaign has ended, I have asked our Finance committee and our Temple Foundation board to continue the efforts of the Campaign committee to increase our endowments for the future of our temple.

It is my honor as your President to personally thank the *Ner Tamid* committee and all who worked to make the campaign a success, especially its chairman, Roger Sugarman. Temple owes Roger a huge thank you for his endless time and devotion to this task. He did so without applause and with humility. Roger, I thank you and your temple thanks you. We as a community and a family would like to present you with this Chanukiah as a token of our thanks. A Chanukiah, similar to the Menorah that stood in the Temple of Solomon in Jerusalem, has a single light, called the Shamash that stands above all the others, just as the Eternal Light or *Ner Tamid* hangs above the ark in every synagogue, including ours. It is said that this symbolizes God's eternal and imminent presence in our community and in our lives. We hope you enjoy the warmth of its

light and remember Temple Israel when you use it.

Just as the Eternal Light burns constantly over our ark, representing God's eternal presence in our community, so too will our acknowledgement of those who contributed to our campaign be displayed in our temple for eternity. The new entrance wall to our building, which I invite all to see as you exit today, has the names of everyone who has contributed etched for all to see. The wall is made of Jerusalem stone which symbolizes our past while the names etched in the stone symbolize our future. The materials were all recycled and leftover materials keeping our cost to a minimum. We have designed this dedication wall so it can be easily changed. We welcome all new gifts, and we will be proud to add your name amongst the others. The gifts we receive will help increase our endowments and help secure the future of our congregation. In honor of Roger, the entire *Ner Tamid* committee and those who helped make this campaign a success, I would like us all to join in the dedication of this accomplishment by saying with me the *Shehekianu* prayer:

*We praise you, Eternal God, Sovereign of the Universe,
for giving us life, for sustaining us, and for enabling us
to reach this occasion.*

Another reason our budget is balanced is that we made decisions to cut expenses wherever possible. This is the job of your board, to safeguard temple's survival and plan for its continued success. Our expenses are now more than \$250,000 less than they were just a few years ago, through a reduction in support and professional staff and the elimination of some programming. This is a year in which we ask for your increased investment of volunteer initiative and leadership and if possible, an enhancement of your annual financial contribution. Offer an extra contribution to a temple fund or foundation fund. Increase your gift to the *Ner Tamid* campaign or make your first gift. Help support those who are financially unable. Help Temple Israel thrive.

So, as a Board, we are doing our part financially to aggressively deal with our debt and budget. But, we have other tasks that are equally important. Some of you may remember my message at the annual meeting five months ago when I articulated a few of my goals for the coming year. One was increased membership and engagement through community building. In an atmosphere of anxiety, fueled by the recession, many young families are putting off synagogue membership despite their attachment to Judaism. Some are even electing to leave. They just have too many bills to even start thinking about how to finagle membership dues.

I am very pleased to announce that through a generous gift from Bonnie and David Milenthal, we have introduced the Young Adult Membership Initiative. This gift will be used to partially subsidize the membership dues for new young families presently unaffiliated with a central Ohio temple. It will also help with new programming initiatives that will engage the younger members of our community. I have asked a committee of very dedicated and bright young

They will then weigh the gold in grams on highly sensitive & accurate equipment. The Troy Ounce, the international standard of conversion, is the measurement used in pricing of gold.

The payout to you is based on the daily London Fix gold price. The London Fix is the recognized standard for pricing gold throughout the world.

What happens to the gold? It is recycled & sold to major jewelry manufacturers.

What if my gold has precious stones in the settings? They will be removed for you.

Why do this? It's a win for you & a win for Temple. You will receive a pay-out from the sale of your old gold. Temple will receive a percentage from your pay-out too. A simple, clean fundraiser.

What if I can't be here? You don't have to be. You can send a packet or bag of your gold, with the bag marked with your name & phone number, you will be called, told the pay-out & asked if you wish to sell.

How will I be paid? In cash. If you leave a bag of gold at Temple, Temple will deposit the cash & write a check to you for the full amount.

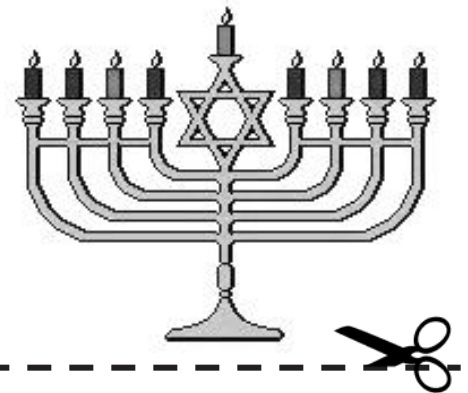

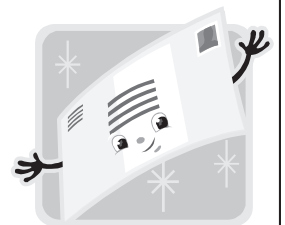
