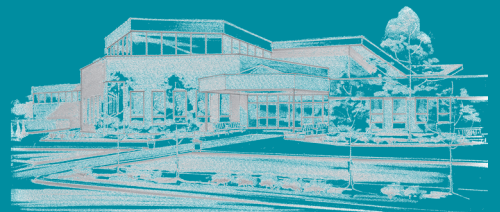

# Message of Faith

## Ready to Turn the Page S'lichot Program September 13

of the challenges our country and the world face.

With this backdrop, the High Holy Days will arrive quite soon and it should be said therefore, that we are indeed ready to return to confidence, optimism, and hope, to pray for a sense of equilibrium and firm ground beneath our feet. Our annual return, what we call in Hebrew, *t'shuvah*, is perhaps as natural as all other cycles which the Holy One put into motion when first the world was created. This is to say that in every creation, is its own internal mechanism for returning to the essence of its existence. And in surveying the past year, I am indeed ready to return to a clean page in the book.

So let us begin the season then, on **Sunday, September 13**, with a very special *S'lichot* service and program. The context for this program is our collective reality: the economic downturn our country has experienced and which has touched each and every one of us in ways that need not be spelled out here. Having said that, "the economy" is the lead story on every news broadcast, dominates the airwaves and the Internet, and is the conversation at dinner tables and social gatherings. How are we coping?

To address the issue from a spiritual and personal perspective, we have invited several members of our congregation to consider the realities that the new economy has placed before them. These are business professionals who have never experienced the kind of changes 2009 wrought. We have asked them to consider questions we all must face: *How have we responded to the formidable challenges with which the recession has confronted us? How have we drawn upon*

Perhaps more than most years we can remember, this year we have an acute sense that we are indeed ready to turn the page to a new beginning, from a year which has been extraordinarily fragile, what with the bank failures, the continuing conflict in Iraq and the war in Afghanistan, nuclear threats from oppressive regimes in Iran and North Korea, the continuing recession and pessimistic forecasts for recovery, to mention just a few

*our faith to face days that are difficult and sometimes frightening and even depressing? Have we reordered our priorities from the pursuit of wealth to the pursuit of meaning? Have we changed our ways, demanding of ourselves more sacrifices for the greater good? Have we thought more about our relationship to God in this crisis? Have new things taken on more importance? What kind of people has this recession asked us to become?*

We will hear their stories and weave them into our *S'lichot* service, a brief contemplative setting of poetry and melody. We will have an opportunity to consider their honest reflections, ask some questions, and share our own stories. Aware that our usual setting for the *S'lichot* service and program falls this year on the night of the OSU-USC football game, **we will convene on Sunday evening, September 13, beginning at 5:00 PM, with a wine and cheese reception, followed by the service and program. We will conclude the evening by 7:00 PM.**

On this special evening of the *S'lichot* season, let us consider the present challenges, even as we prepare for Rosh Hashanah and its recollection of the perfection of creation. And at this season, just as God remembers our deeds, we shall examine our own lives, and pray for the strength that leads to peace and hope.

As we prepare for the beginning of this new year, may we enter it with generous portions of optimism, cheerfulness and expectations for better tomorrows. May our days and our lives be filled with the enduring significance of the important things: of many shared *simchas*, of moments of laughter and joy, of meaningful conversation and learning, and of uplifting and inspiring memories and dreams.

### ABOUT THE COVER:

#### Sculpture Relief of The Burning Bush celebrates 50 years

Laura Ziegler is the artist who created the modern sculpture that adorns the Broad Street side of Temple Israel. The solid copper sculpture stands thirty feet high and weighs 2600 pounds. Laura Ziegler is an American artist who lives and works in Lucca, Italy. Ziegler, born in 1927, is a native of Columbus. In 1949 she was awarded a Fulbright Scholarship to Italy for the study of polychromed sculpture. While living in Rome with her musician husband, Herbert Handt, she was commissioned to create The Burning Bush adornment for Temple Israel's new building on East Broad Street. A year of planning went into the project and in January 1959 she arrived in Columbus to start construction. Four welders from Aircraft Ornamental Iron Company worked with her in welding the 178 pieces of the sculpture

together. It was then erected by Alpine Steel Erectors, Inc. and has seventy-nine anchors holding it fast to the building. The sculpture is based on three elements: the Menorah, the Angel of God and the Star of David. Laura's intention was to bring together the essences of Judaism or the "sense" of it without specifics. "So that when you look at it, it looks Jewish," she said. "It is symbolic of the biblical burning bush and the Torah: a tree of life to them that lay hold of it, and the supporters thereof are happy. Its ways are ways of pleasantness and all its paths are peace."

Tashlich is the service held on the afternoon of Rosh Hashanah when we begin the year by symbolically casting away the sins of the past year by throwing breadcrumbs into a flowing body of water.

Streaming will be available for all Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services.

### Alternative Service

Temple Israel will again offer an additional service on the mornings of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. These services will be led by Congregant volunteer, Rabbi Sharon Mars. This "alternative" to the Main Sanctuary service will begin at 10:30 AM in the Chapel and conclude at the same time as the Sanctuary service. Consistent with the intimacy of the Folkman Chapel and the less formal language of the "Contemporary Service" prayerbook, the service will rely on the soulful sound made by the congregation's participation. There will be no formal sermon, but the service will include informal interactive learning throughout. Rabbi Mars is accustomed to children's comings-and-goings not being a distraction. The same ticket/pass will permit members to attend either morning service.

### Making Connections in the Religious School

With the start of the new school year, I am pleased to share news of several exciting developments in our Religious School. The Religious Education Committee, chaired by Jennie Cammeyer, and I have used the feedback we received from students, parents, and teachers as a guide for these additions to our school program. The foundation of our plans for the upcoming year is the idea of making connections—among our students and their families, and between our school and the rest of the congregation. To that end, here are some of the components being introduced this year:

#### **Kehillah** (Community)

Each Sunday, the Religious School community will gather together for part of the morning. Our students, teachers, and parents will have the opportunity to share morning blessings, celebrate accomplishments, and learn as a *kehillah*.

#### **Kevutzot** (Teams)

On Opening Day, our students will be welcomed onto a *kevutzah* as well as into a classroom. Each of our grade-based *kevutzot* will have the opportunity to earn points throughout the year.

#### **Middah** (Virtue) of the Month

The Jewish recipe for being a good human being identifies certain characteristics or virtues as being essential. As a school community, we will explore several of these *middot* over the course of the year. The spotlight *middah* will be introduced on this page each month.

#### **High Holy Day Programming**

During the morning service on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur teachers from the Religious School will be leading educational programs for our school-aged children. These sessions will include a worship component led by our teens.

Fannie's energies were always devoted to her family, friends and charitable causes, including Children's Hospital Twigs. Our mortgage debt has been reduced by nearly \$1.25 million and should be fully retired sometime in 2010. Our Foundation's endowment has been restored to pre-2008 levels.

The Campaign remained true to its purpose and, in large part, successfully fulfilled its two primary goals.

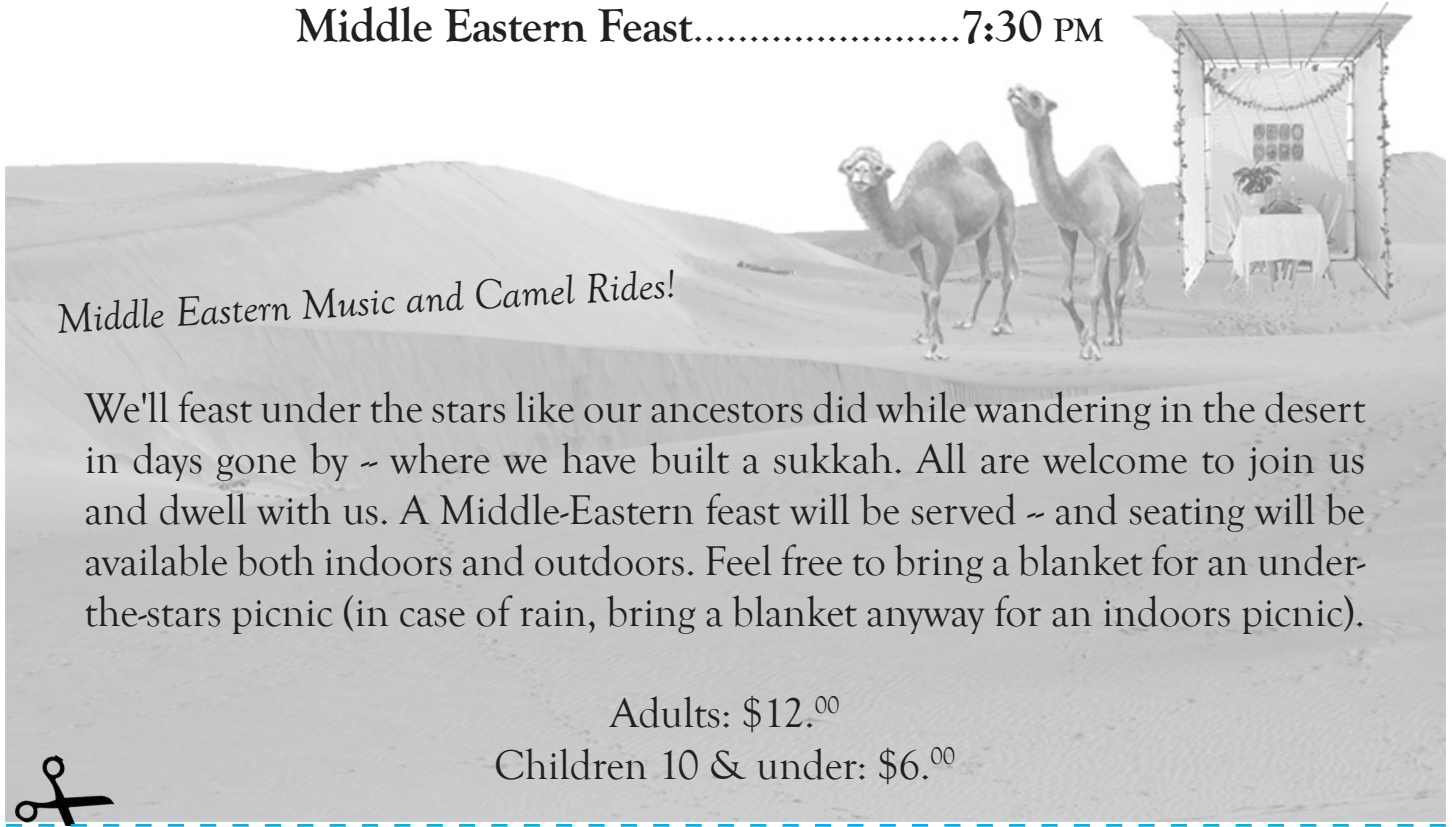
