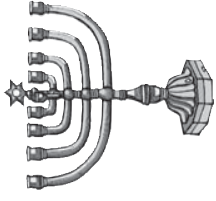

Around the World:

Iran launched a second uranium-enrichment facility.

The umbrella body for U.S. Jewish groups called for the prosecution of a former Iranian president for his alleged role in the 1994 attack on Argentinean Jews.

The Pension Protection Act of 2006 Offers Opportunities for Some Donors to Make Charitable Contributions Directly from Their IRAs



Men and women who established IRAs and who will be at least age 70 ½ in 2006 or 2007 have a unique opportunity to make a significant impact on Temple Israel by making charitable donations directly from their IRAs during those two years.

Donors may make charitable donations of up to \$100,000 each year, in a lump sum or in several denominations.

Why is this so important to donors and non-profits like Temple Israel?

Unlike current distributions from an IRA which are taxable once the owner of the IRA starts withdrawing funds (which the owner is required to do once reaching age

70 ½) or are taxable to his/her heirs, there is no tax when the funds are transferred directly from the IRA to the charity. Since these funds were not taxed when they were initially transferred into the IRA, there is no charitable deduction for the gift.

However, by reducing the amount in one's IRA, the donor reduces the amount of future income and tax on the donor's estate taxes and income tax implications on the heirs who receive the IRA funds. Where a donor has other retirement assets that have more favorable tax advantages, the benefit to the donor and his/her heirs is a reduction in taxes which increases the size of the donor's estate and the donor's ability

to allocate assets in ways that are most meaningful and beneficial to the donor and his/her family.

Temple Israel is a qualified IRA recipient organization under the Pension Protection Act. By making a gift from an IRA to the Temple, a donor has the additional satisfaction of knowing that he/she will assure that Temple Israel remains a strong and vital resource to meet the ever growing needs of our community.

Shalom From the Religious School

“The Season of Giving” is a phrase many of us hear repeatedly during the month of December. This phrase is used as a way of encouraging people to think of others as we open our wallets and purses to celebrate with gift giving. In recent years it has become customary for many families to choose a night of Chanukah to give to those less fortunate rather than to receive yet another sweater or video game. Using this practice in my own family, I have found it allows my husband, my children and me to discuss and count our family’s blessings together.

I am pleased to say that in the Temple Israel Religious School we focus on Tzedakah and giving throughout the entire year – not just in the month of December. I am proud to report that the students in the Religious School, with some help from the Temple Israel Preschool, collected hundreds of pieces of clothing for the Kae Avenue School in Whitehall. In addition, many students also brought in games and books to donate to the school during the month of October.

Each of the Religious School classes have been very busy learning about and choosing a social action program to support. Our Kindergarteners were paid a visit by a dog from the Humane Society Society of Columbus, OH. The students have also been learning about how seeing-eye dogs can help make peoples’ lives better. As a result, the Tzedakah money raised by our kindergartners will be given to both the Humane Society of Columbus, OH and the Israel Guide Dog Center for the Blind.

Our 5th grade has created and raised money with “Dolls For Darfur” in order to raise awareness of the situation in the Sudan. The money being raised by this project goes directly to the Save Darfur campaign. Currently the 6th and the 2nd grades of the Religious School are raising money to support the Make-A-Wish Foundation. This is just a glimpse of some of the classes and the work that they are doing during the ENTIRE school year to help others. Once all the classes in the Religious School have selected their project we will publish a comprehensive list of what each class is supporting in their efforts.

In addition to helping others with their Tzedakah money, each month one grade will be given an opportunity to teach the Religious School about the organization that they have chosen to support at one of the weekly *Tifilah* (prayer) services. In their presentation students will explain what the organization does and why they have chosen to support this particular organization.

The Temple Israel Religious School encourages its students to think about others in their local, national and international community throughout the year – not just during this “Season of Giving.” However, this is a great time of year to sit down with your children to discuss what it means to give to others. Ask your children to share what they have learned in class about choosing a Tzedakah

recipient. Ask them what their thoughts are on this organization. Take time to share with them the causes that you find worthy of receiving your Tzedakah dollars.

May you and your family gather together under the glow of the Chanukah candles and find the time to count your blessings together!

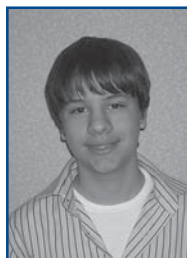

Now, Here's a Bright Idea!

There are two types of *midrashim*, rabbinic interpretive stories. The first is the kind with which most of us are familiar; a story that explains something that is missing or unclear from the Torah. The story of Abraham smashing his father's idols as the first act of monotheistic rebellion is one of these *midrashim* called *midrash aggadah*. The other category of *midrash* also involves stories but they explain the *mitzvot*, commandments, and thus are called *midrash halacha*.

If you have ever heard that we light two candles on Shabbat because of the two Shabbat-related commandments (*shamor*, observe, and *zachor*, remember) then you already know a *midrash halacha*.

While the canon of *midrashim* is mostly comprised of work from the second to tenth centuries, there are those who continue to create both categories of *midrashim* in modern times. Even so, it surprised me to hear that there is a *midrash* about the halacha of spelling the word Hanukah in transliteration. (We know this is a modern *midrash* because it has not been that long that Jews have been concerned with spelling Hanukah in English transliteration.)

There are any number of ways to spell the Hebrew name of the Festival of Lights. I usually choose the way with the least letters. The *midrash*, however, teaches that there should be eight letters in the name as there are eight nights in the festival. (The origins of this *midrash* are unclear. I learned it from Melissa Dickman, the Religious School Administrative Assistant, who told it to me in the name of Jennifer Jordan, who formerly held her position.) Of course, even with this orthographic guidance there are still a variety of ways to spell Hanukah. Chanukah, Channuka, Chanukka, Hannukah, and Hanukkah all have eight letters.

Actually, the variety of spellings for the name Hanukah is fitting since there are so many ways to understand the holiday's meanings and lessons. Whether we choose to celebrate the miracle of the oil, the military victory, or the fight to resist assimilation we should also recognize that Hanukah is about rededication. At the end of each of the stories of Hanukah, the Maccabees rededicate the Temple to allow for the worship of God after the Greek forces had made it impure with their worship of other gods.

This year, we have a similar opportunity to make something holy. In Jewish thought the opposite of holy (*kadosh*) is ordinary (*chol*). At the end of the Havdalah ceremony we bless God as the one who separates Shabbat (*kadosh*) from the weekdays (*chol*). It is possible to change something from *chol* to *kadosh* by dedicating it to God. For instance, in

biblical times, an Israelite's offering of thanksgiving or atonement came from his ordinary field or flock but was set aside as belonging to God. Changing the ordinary to holy was a matter of intent and action.

This month, making the ordinary into something holy is as simple as changing a light bulb. The Coalition on the Environment and Jewish Life (COEJL) is sponsoring a campaign to increase the use of compact fluorescent light (CFL) bulbs in Jewish homes and institutions across the country. Why CFLs? These light bulbs use up to 75% less energy than regular incandescent light bulbs, and last seven to ten times longer. Purchasing CFLs will reduce greenhouse gas emissions, air pollution, and toxic waste. If every home in country replaced just one bulb with a CFL, it would have the same impact as removing one million cars from the road. More information about CFL bulbs and the fight against global warming can be found at COEJL's website: www.coejl.org.

Certainly it would be good if every Temple Israel family changed their light bulbs to CFLs. More so, the ordinary CFL bulb can be made holy through the *kavannah* (intent) that accompanies its installation. By purchasing and using this energy efficient ordinary object, we are acting as stewards of creation. Each time we turn on a light with a CFL bulb we are rededicating ourselves to the effort of *tikkun olam*, repair of the world.

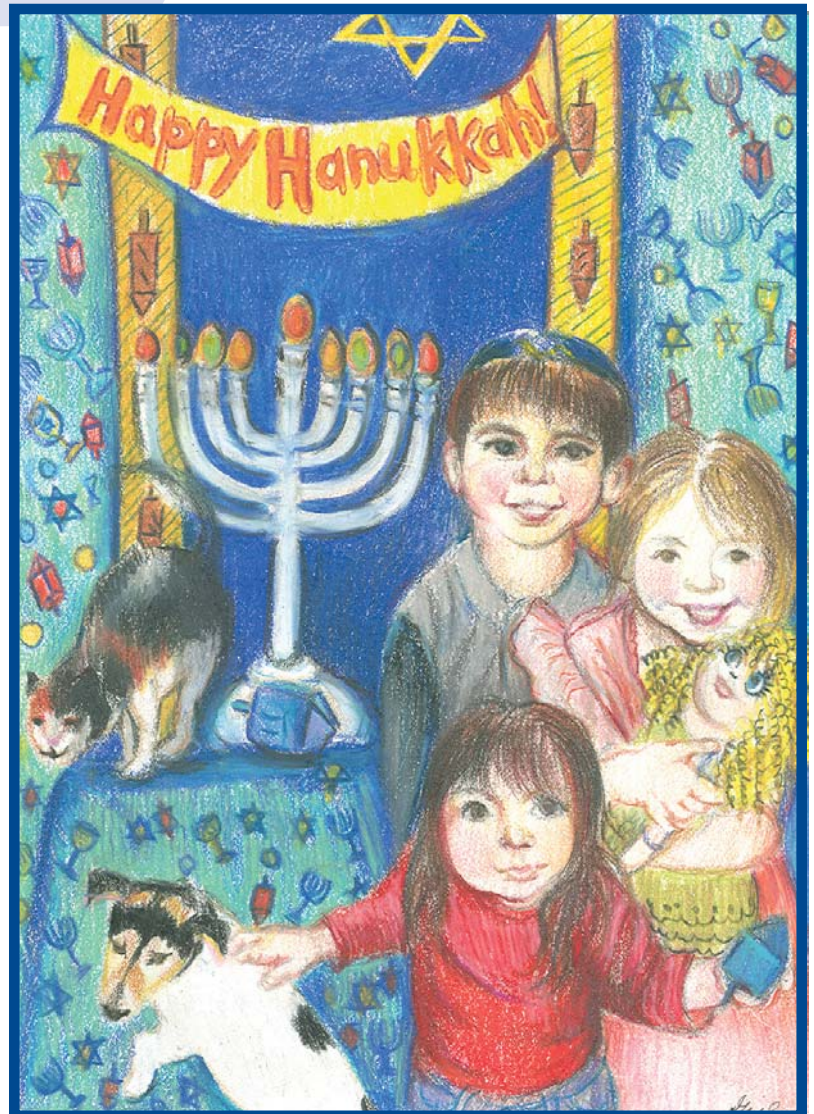
