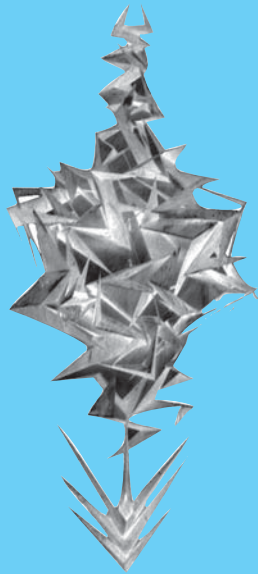

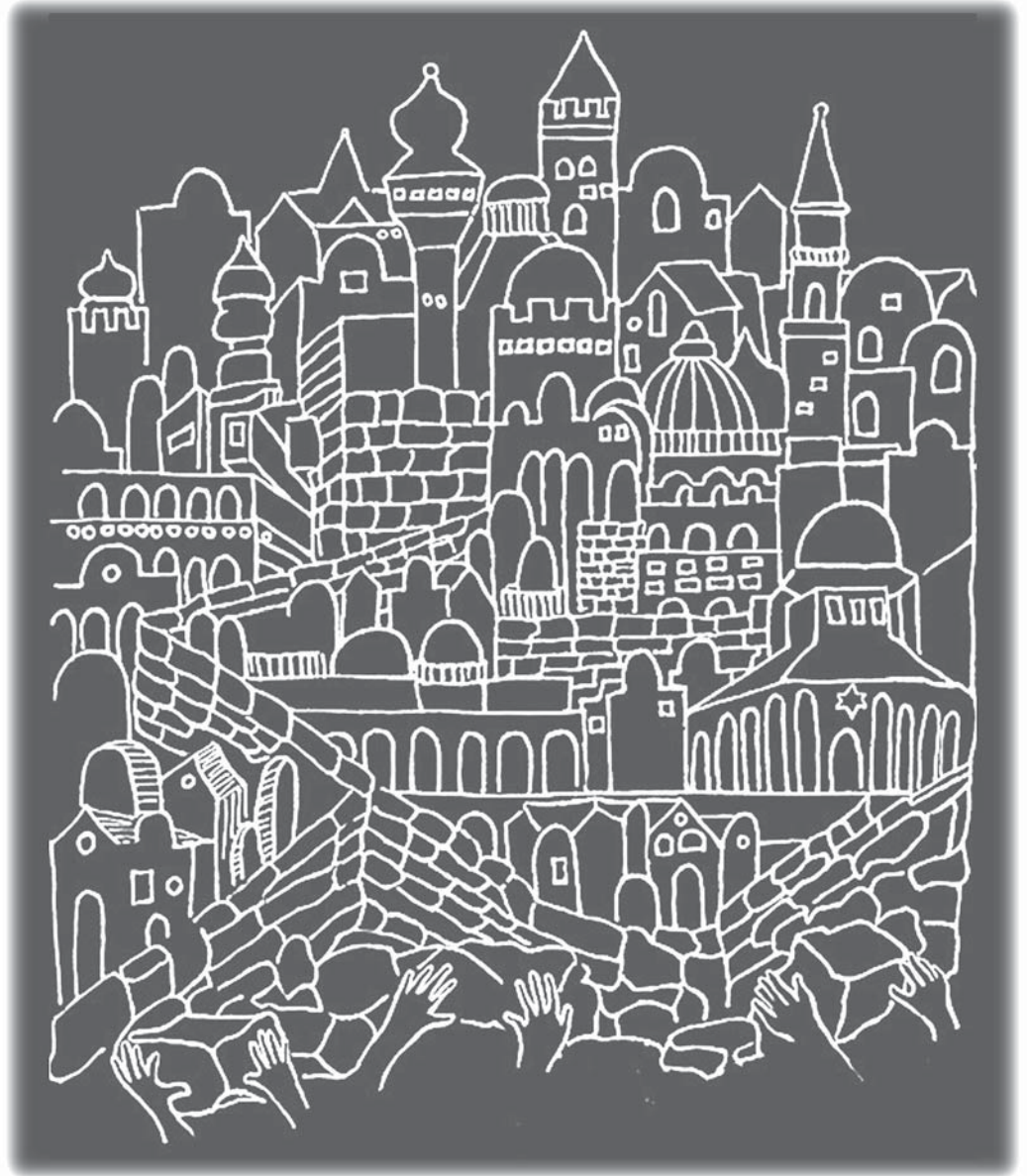

On June 4, nine very thoughtful and sincere 10th graders led a beautiful service for their Confirmation as the culmination of their formal learning in our religious school. They led the morning prayers with skill and confidence as friends and family in the congregation prayed proudly with them. The confirmation experience that begins in the 8th grade, post B'nai Mitzvah, is a wonderful opportunity for our young people to connect in very profound ways to each other, to the Temple, to the Jewish community and to their faith. After Bar and Bat Mitzvah, when much of the learning is focused on synagogue skills, such as prayer-leading and Torah reading, 8th – 10th graders begin to dig more intensely into some of the “big questions” in Judaism and in life. At the end of the 10th grade year, every student writes an original essay to address the Maimonidean formula: “I believe with perfect faith...” I am so proud of the students’ learning and the unaffected style of their personal expressions of faith that I would like to share some of the highlights of their personal statements with you here:

The Torah recognizes the intrinsic value of the relationships humans can share. As we read this week’s Torah portion we will be recounting when God gave the Torah to the Jewish people. But God didn’t just give us the Torah. God asked for something in return, a collateral. When the Jewish people heard this, they despaired because they had just wandered the desert for forty years and had nothing that could match the value of the Torah. Yet God reassured them they did. God said he would give them the Torah if they would teach it to their children and their children’s children. It wasn’t just the teaching that made this a worthy collateral for the Torah, it was the fact that the Jewish people were entrusting God with the most precious possession they had, the love that they shared with their children.

“Everything is foreseen [by God], yet a person has the capacity to choose freely” (Avot 3:15). This teaching from Tractate Avot tells us that God does know what is going to happen at all times. This also tells us that we have the will to do whatever we want. The thing is that God knows about it before we do. Rabbi Hanina ben Hama said, “Everything is in the hands of Heaven except the fear of heaven.” This has been interpreted as God gives humans guidance and even intervenes at times. Our human moral choices depend on our personal spiritual feelings that God has bestowed upon us.

I believe with perfect faith that there is, for lack of a better term, something bigger than me, bigger than us, bigger than humanity. Maimonides in his first Principle of Faith, says that the creator is the author and guide of everything that has and will be created and in

his third Principle, that God has no shape or form. I do believe in both these principles, that there was some divine spark that began this earth, and that whatever or whoever God is, is not a body or a shape. At camp a couple of years ago, a couple of friends and I illicitly left the cabin at around two in the morning and went to the soccer field and laid there for about an hour, just looking at the stars. I think it would be difficult for anyone to witness such an amazing view of the universe, and not believe that there is some larger being watching over earth.

I believe with perfect faith that the study of Torah resides over all other Jewish religious practices. Jewish tradition says that studying Torah is valued as one of the most important activities for both children and adults. Jewish tradition also says that the primary texts of Judaism all encourage Jews to study Torah. That is why the Jewish people are often called “the people of the book,” because we derive most of our religion from a book. Since most of our traditions are based on the Torah, its study is the most important. The study of Torah, in my opinion, *is* the Jewish religion.

Jewish tradition teaches that the actions of people are significant. As stated in the Torah, the Jews are given the Torah and are commanded to follow its rules with rewards that are given out accordingly. For this to be true, people must have free will. People were put on earth to heal the world because God does not have the arms and legs to do it on his own. I, however, believe that God does not tell people how to heal the world, but allows the people to make their own decisions and lets them think for themselves and figure out how to make lives better for all people.

Personally, Judaism is not solely based around the Torah and textual information and studies, but rather on traditions and customs performed within my family. Each family has their own set of customs, which is, although unique compared to other families, still within the boundaries of Jewish faith. Customs can range from going to the synagogue every Friday night or Saturday morning to just attending services on the High Holidays; from lighting Sabbath candles on Shabbat to using a traditional menorah within our homes each Hanukkah season. These customs have become tradition in our homes and it is important to start new ones so that generations later to come will have their own familial customs.

I believe with perfect faith that Jews have an obligation to mend the world. One of the many reasons we were put on this Earth is to make the world a better place. We can’t just assume someone else will take care of it either; we must assume that if we don’t work toward a better world, nobody else will. It may not seem like “destiny” for some Jews since *tikkun olam* is a commandment, but I see *tikkun olam* as a destiny in my own life. Part of my destiny is to help repair the world—I don’t know where that destiny came from, but I know it’s there.

I believe righteousness is determined not by action or thought alone, but both. I believe that one must adhere to one’s own moral code,

not one set by others. I believe a person's actions should not be determined by whether or not it will benefit themselves or whether it will benefit other people, but whether or not it is what they believe is the right thing to do. In Deuteronomy 11:26, it states, "I am placing before you both a blessing and a curse." This describes the choice, where the blessing is righteousness and the curse is evil. Also in Deuteronomy, it states, "I have set before you a choice between life and good and death and evil." Every person makes this choice.

I believe with perfect faith that the human soul lives on in the temporal world after the body dies. One's soul is remembered by what they have done to better this world. It could be as enormous as being a leader of a nation, or as quaint as nurturing a grandchild. Through Torah study and through the study of other Jewish texts, great teachers, although gone for many generations, still live among us. When we study Judaism, we learn about great figures of the past and can aspire to their teachings and values. For example, in the Torah, we learn about Moses, and every generation of Jews knows him as their teacher and rabbi. His soul has lived on well beyond his death.

Mazel tov to the Confirmation Class of 5766. As you can see, our students have become our teachers.

SAEMAN YOUTH FUND TO PROVIDE ANNUAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Henry and Mitzi Saeman sought to develop a scholarship program that encouraged Temple youth to "give even as they receive." Following Henry's death, Mitzi and son, Marty, established the **Henry and Joseph Saeman Youth Scholarship Program** under the auspices of the Temple Israel Foundation, which provides \$500 annually to the Youth Activities budget for need-based youth scholarships.

The Saemans have always believed in the importance of *tzedakah* as well as youth programming. They consider the combination to be an investment in a child's Jewish future. B'nai Mitzvah students are informed about the program and the students are asked to contribute \$18 to the Saeman Youth Scholarship Fund, which will be matched by the Saemans to enable the program to continue.

Students who participate in the Youth Scholarship Program by contributing to this will be recognized as program sponsors in the *Tikun* in their B'nai Mitzvah biography.

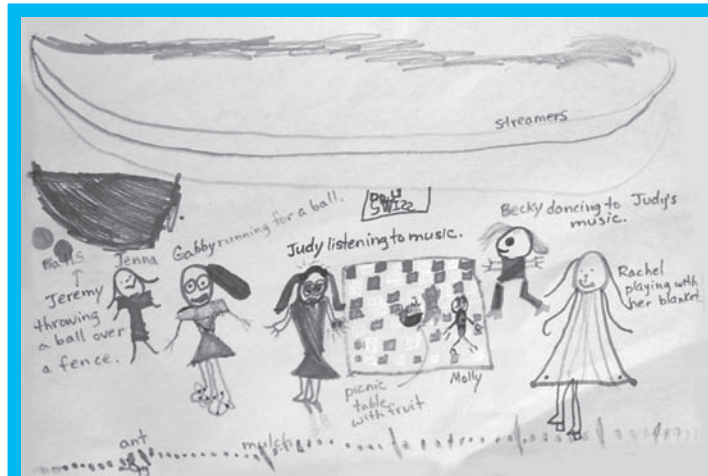

On Monday, May 8, thirty-seven members from Temple Israel attended the annual assembly of the B.R.E.A.D. organization (Building Responsibility, Equality, and Dignity). With almost 2,000 members from forty-eight churches and synagogues throughout Columbus, the B.R.E.A.D. assembly urged action on the problem of truancy in public schools. In response to B.R.E.A.D.'s request, Franklin County Prosecutor Ron O'Brien agreed to bring local officials together to address the problem.

Temple Israel joined B.R.E.A.D. last year and the number of congregants at the May 8 Assembly was the largest number we have ever sent to a B.R.E.A.D. meeting. We are looking to strengthen our involvement with this religiously based community organization to fight for social justice in our communities. TZEDAKAH OF THE MONTH

Indonesia Earthquake Relief

A major earthquake of 6.2 magnitude struck Indonesia on Saturday morning, May 27. Current death estimates around the densely populated city of Yogyakarta are now at 5,400 and rising. An additional 20,000 people are injured and 200,000 people are now homeless. Due to aftershocks, many hospitals are moving their patients outdoors and victims are sleeping outside in rainy conditions. In addition, the Mt. Merapi volcano, 100 miles northeast of Yogyakarta, continues to emit gas and ash and threatens to erupt. **The American Jewish World Service** and the **American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee (JDC)** have opened special funds to provide needed aid to the victims.
