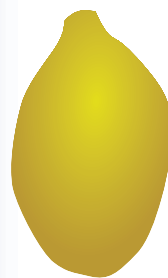

## Make Shabbat Your Sanctuary

Our sanctuary, filled as it is during these holy days, reminds us of the power of prayer and community, the unique mix of the collective voice and of silence, of melody and of instrument, of laughter and of tears. The commotion in the hallways and the shofar blasts from the bima, the crisp air that blows the Tashlikh crumbs on the water, and the salty taste of herring after a long day of fasting move us into the new year refreshed, and fortified with renewed commitments and earnest pledges. We are, as the season returns each year to remind us, to embrace life, to engage the Holy One of Blessing in a life-long dialogue, and to love each other. This is why we pray as a community. This is what gives life to a congregation, and that is why praying regularly, daily and weekly, is central to how Jews thrive. Personally and collectively, we celebrate life's holy possibilities and express gratitude to the Creator for giving us those opportunities.

Temple Israel is a home that provides many opportunities to recognize the divine in our lives, and during the past two years, I have noticed with delight that our weekly Shabbat services have grown steadily in attendance. This matters to me, and I hope that our Chapel will be even more filled this year. I believe that a praying, singing, celebrating, and sometimes grieving community on Shabbat is a sign of a healthy congregation. Prayer has always been at the center of how our people has uniquely expressed itself, how we have maintained

continuity and our relationship with God. It is through liturgical expressions of gratitude, of yearnings for a better world, of visions of peace that we have moved from the sanctuary into the world of action, of healing and of *tikkun*-repair. Strong synagogues have a robust prayer life. I am thrilled each week to stand at the doors of our congregation as I say "Shabbat shalom"

to more and more people. I am uplifted and inspired by our experience of worship together, and the more pray-ers around me, the better.

After the High Holy Days, it is understandable that we feel a little fatigued. After all, many of us have spent as much time at the temple in 10 days as we...well you get the picture. However, as a matter of fact, when I see the High Holy Day congregation, I recognize every face, and that would not happen if we were only a twice-a-year community. We aren't. Yet many people say to me, "Rabbi, the holidays were exquisite, can't wait until next year." And so it goes. We have a well-kept secret I would like to let out: a wonderful prayer and musical experience awaits you every week on Shabbat, a warm community of fellowship, and even a few words of Torah

to live by. I urge you to make Shabbat your sanctuary and your inspiration for a more sacred existence.

On Shabbat morning, October 21, we shall kick off AMOS (A Multiple Opportunity Shabbat), see p. 16 for details.

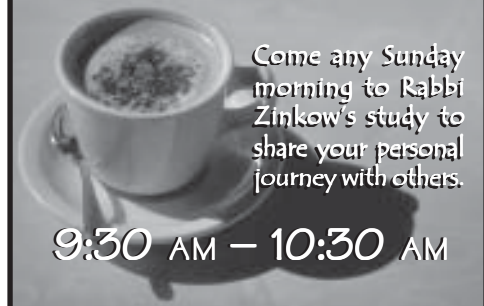

## Religious School Is Off to a Great Start!

On Sunday, September 10 the Religious School began with a musical welcome led by Bryan Zive, Temple Israel's cantorial soloist. The Religious School community joined in and had the whole sanctuary rocking to the beat of the students' favorite Hebrew songs. In participation with the Union of Reform Judaism's weekend of solidarity for Israel the community stood and sang Hatikvah, Israel's national anthem. Following the assembly students were introduced to their teachers and classmates.

While our students were hard at work in their classrooms parents were given the opportunity to choose from a number of learning opportunities. Rabbi Zinkow led a discussion about Israel. Parents could also choose to have Rabbi Rosenweig answer questions about the Union of Reform Judaism's Chai curriculum which is currently being used by the 2<sup>nd</sup> to 7<sup>th</sup> grades at our school. Pamela Feldman-Hill met with parents interested in learning more about our Mitkadem Hebrew program and

finally Jennifer Aaron, our special needs coordinator for the Religious School, met with parents who had questions about their children's particular learning issues.

were all treated to Apples and Honey as a traditional Rosh Hashanah treat. The kindergarten is hard at work preparing for their Consecration service on October 15. The community is welcome to attend this milestone event for our youngest class.

Another upcoming program in October is the continuing partnership of the Religious School with the Sisterhood in preparing a monthly meal for the Homeless. This program allows different classes of students to help the sisterhood prepare the meal. Students can also

volunteer to help deliver these meals as well. On October 8 the 5 grade class will be the class to assist the women of the sisterhood in this wonderful social action program.

The Religious School program is fortunate to have such a wonderful teaching staff this year. Please feel free to take some time to get to know your child's teacher and class helpers or *Madrichim*. This year the Religious School has been honored with a grant to mentor new teachers under the wisdom of our more experienced staff members and has also received grant monies to provide professional training for the *Madrichim*.

## Social Justice Retreat for Columbus Congregations

During the weekend of August 25-27, lay leaders from the Reform congregations in Columbus gathered for an intensive leadership training. The retreat, co-sponsored by B.R.E.A.D (Building Responsibility, Equality, and Dignity) and the Jewish Funds for Justice (JFJ), was designed to train people to organize their congregations for social justice work. The JFJ chose Columbus and B.R.E.A.D. as a pilot program to see how Jewish congregations could work with community organizations.

The weekend included Torah studies and workshops in active listening and planning for performance provided by leadership trainers from the JFJ. "I learned at the conference," remarked **Bev Darwin**, co-chair of Temple Israel's Social Action Committee, "that one of the important steps in building participation and interest in social action is to build relationships with other to learn their real felt needs and interests." Darwin was joined by fellow congregants **Sherry Linhart** and **Mitchell Snay**.

## Protect Yourself From the Flu!

Get your flu shot at Temple Israel on Sunday, October 29.

As a benefit to our congregants, Temple Israel has arranged for LifeCare Alliance\*, the Visiting Nurse Association of Central Ohio, to administer influenza vaccines at Temple Israel on Sunday morning, October 29 from 9 AM to 11 AM.

### Why get vaccinated?

Influenza (flu) is a serious health problem, killing up to 36,000 individuals each year and hospitalizing 114,000 more.

### How does the vaccine work?

Protection develops about two weeks after getting the shot and may last up to a year. Some people who get the flu vaccine may still get the flu but usually it is a milder case than those who did not get the shot.

### Who should get the vaccine?

- Everyone 50 years of age and older
- Residents of long-term care facilities
- Anyone with long-term health problems like heart disease, lung disease, asthma, kidney problems, diabetes
- Anyone with a weakened immune system
- Healthcare workers or people in close contact with individuals at high risk of

getting a serious case of flu (including family members)

- Anyone living in dormitories or other crowded conditions
- Anyone who wants to reduce their risk of the flu

**Please note:** Lifecare Alliance does not administer the flu vaccine to pregnant women or children under 18 - these individuals should see their personal physician for flu immunization

### Who Should NOT get the vaccine:

- Persons with allergic reactions to eggs or to a previous flu vaccine
- Persons with a history of Guillain-Barre Syndrome

**Cost:** Lifecare Alliance will bill Medicare Part B, MediGold, Senior Advantage, Railroad Medicare and United Mine Workers of America. Those individuals must present Medicare insurance cards and do not pay at the time of immunization since LifeCare Alliance is a Medicare certified agency. **All other participants pay \$25.00 per immunization, cash or check only.**

**CALL TO SCHEDULE YOUR FLU SHOT:** 866-0010, ext. 104, Melissa Dickman.

\*LifeCare Alliance immunization clinics are staffed by registered nurses only and they work under the standing orders of their medical director following all CDC recommendations. Each year they immunize over 10,000 individuals through public, corporate and private clinics.

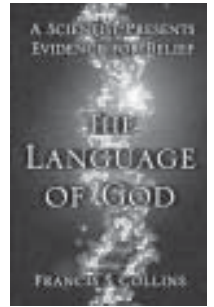
