Taking an Accounting of Your Soul

School supplies are in the seasonal aisle of the supermarket. Sweaters are stacked on the shelves in the department stores. Commercials for season premieres are running on television. It must be

High Holy Day season.

Like September for a baseball team or February for a Hollywood studio, the month leading up to Rosh Hashanah, the month of Elul, is crunch time for synagogue professionals. Service schedules must be set, tickets mailed, robes pressed, security hired, melodies practiced, sermons written, and break-the-fast bagels ordered.

But Jewish tradition assigns more than logistics to the month of Elul. For this month, specifically to prepare for the High Holy Days, our ancient rabbis suggest the practice of *heshbon ha'nefesh*, literally an accounting of the soul. After all, how can we ask for forgiveness or offer thanks for what has happened in the past year if we haven't taken the time to reflect upon it? In modern Hebrew, *heshbon* is the bill in a restaurant, so one might think of this practice as looking over the dinner check before signing it.

The practice of *heshbon ha'nefesh* is almost that simple—at least in the questions, the answers can be difficult. To complete this accounting each person must ask him or herself the following questions keeping in mind that the world starts with the individual and includes personal

relationships, community/ies, the Jewish people, and the physical world.

What have I done that has improved the world?

What have I done, intentionally or unintentionally, that has harmed the world?

Have I given to the world as much as I am able?

How far am I from where I want to be with my answers to these questions?

In my years as a student rabbi I found it difficult to switch from “I-really-need-to-write-my-sermons” mode to actual, personal High Holy Day preparation. Maybe you’ve had a similar “what’s-going-on-I-was-just-doing-my-usual-thing-and-now-I’m-reading-all-this-stuff-about-life-and-death-and-sin-and-merit-!?” feeling. Well, this year I am going to take advantage of Elul.

Before the school supplies are replaced by Halloween candy, I am going to set aside some time for *heshbon ha'nefesh*. In between clearing out old sweaters and buying new ones, I will prepare my soul as well as my sermon. And some time after television season premieres (at least on Fox), I will welcome 5767 with a sense of completion of 5766. Care to join me?

Temple Israel Religious School 2006/2007

Shalom. I would like to take this opportunity to introduce myself as Temple Israel's new Religious School Director. My name is Julie Stein-Makowsky and I am thrilled to have become a part of the Temple Israel community. Since arriving in Columbus in early July, I have been hard at work getting the Religious School ready to reopen in September.

I would like to thank those families who were able to return their religious school registration in a timely manner and to urge those families who have not sent in the registration to please do so immediately. One of the reasons it is so important to send in your registration is to allow the religious school to know the numbers of students in each grade. Part of the Religious School Educator's job is to order books, arrange room set-ups and to hire teachers. I cannot hire teachers or order books for unregistered students and this puts your children at a disadvantage.

Our first day of Religious School is Sunday, September 10. I envision this as a day of great activity in our building. I am excited as I await this day where I will have an opportunity to meet each and every student along with their families.

This year our school will be continuing to use the URJ's CHAI curriculum for grades 2-7. This curriculum is innovative in its intent to integrate learning about Jewish text, worship and acts of loving-kindness. The weekday Hebrew School will also continue with its very successful Hebrew curriculum: Mitkadem. Interestingly, our Hebrew program is so popular that I had a number of students call me this summer to see if they could continue learning from it throughout the summer.

In addition to our regular Religious School sessions, each 3rd-8th grade class will be participating in a Family Education program on one of the regularly scheduled

Sundays of Religious School. Also, 4th-8th classes will continue partnering with the Temple Sisterhood in providing food for the homeless at the Faith Mission. Watch for the dates as each class will have a specially designated Sunday when they will prepare and serve food for this special project to help those less fortunate.

Finally, watch for more information about the special "Synaplex Shabbat" programs which will allow our Religious School community help to reclaim Shabbat by bringing participants to Temple on Saturday morning. Temple Israel Teens share their Unforgettable Experiences in Israel

On July 9, my brother and I boarded a plane for Israel. We were two of seven Columbus 10th and 11th graders selected by the Columbus Jewish Federation to participate in the P2K (Partnership 2000) program. The purpose of the program was to strengthen the link to our sister city in Israel, Kfar Saba. We arrived on July 10 and immediately traveled to meet our hosts – teens from Kfar Saba. For three weeks, we lived, traveled, learned, and hung out with the seven other teens from Kfar Saba: Nurit, Rotem, Amit, Kim, Omer, Keren, and Carinne Belle.

During the first week, we toured around Israel with the kids from Kfar Saba. In the second week we spent time in Kfar Saba doing volunteer work and learning about daily life for modern Israelis. In our last week, we participated in *Gadna* which is a simulated army training. Our hosts figured they'd get enough of the army in a couple of years, so they were happy to let us experience this without them. The last two days we reconnected with our friends in Kfar Saba. With this unique combination of experiences, we all felt we got a better feel for what life is like for an Israeli teenager.

Our trip ended up being much more than tours and sightseeing. Of course we traveled to some of the major sites including Masada, the Dead Sea, the Sea of Galilee, and the cities of Jerusalem, Tzfat, and Tel Aviv; but the experience really focused on the similarities and differences between the life and culture in Israel and the life and culture in the U.S. It sounds strange, but I think we learned more from participating in the daily life of our friends and in the *Gadna* experience than we did from the tour. Another thing that unfortunately made our trip different from other trips was that two days after we arrived in Israel, the war started. We were in Tzfat the day before Hezbollah kidnapped the Israeli soldiers. We were in Tiberias the day before the missiles started to fall. Even though it was a scary time, it was comforting to have the Israelis with us. They, of course, were worried as well, but they made us feel comfortable since our families were not there with us. Even though our parents were worried and thought often about bringing us home early, we stayed until the schedule end of our trip. All of the people we met from Kfar Saba told us that this meant a lot to them.

In conclusion, we want to thank the Columbus Jewish community and the Federation for

making this trip possible. This trip was an amazing life experience that we will remember for the rest of our lives.

This summer has been the most mind-blowing summer of my life. I climbed Masada at 3:00 am even though I had a sinus infection, camped out in the Negev, rode camels and made 35 new friends from all over the country (and one from Canada). The unique experience of the 36 kids from group 15 (NFTY Adventure) was one that we will never forget.

After the attacks began in the north, our schedule changed. We didn't get to go to Haifa or Tel Aviv, and most of our programs took place in Jerusalem. We were at Kibbutz Hakok near the Kinneret when the Israeli soldiers were kidnapped. When the first ketusha rockets fell on Haifa four days later, we could faintly hear the booms from our kibbutz. On July 13 our counselors told us that NFTY wanted to move us further south. They suggested we call our parents and let them know what was going on. When I finished explaining the situation to my mom, I started crying. I was overwhelmed and frustrated. Why would anyone want to bomb Israel? I simply couldn't get my head around it.

During no part of the trip did I feel I was in any danger. I was never scared, but I was frustrated. When the *L'dor V'dor* kids arrived in Israel, all 600 NFTY kids were divided into three groups: *Tikkun Olam* (mending the world), *Yam l'Yam* (sea-to-sea), and the archaeological dig. I signed up for *Tikkun Olam*, which was supposed to take place in Haifa. We were going to paint buildings and visit children in an orphanage, but because of the terrorists in southern Lebanon, *Tikkun*

Olam was moved to Jerusalem.

Being in Israel when the country is so full of tension has made me realize several things. First of all, American media overreacts about the Mideast situation. When we called our parents on July 13, my Israeli friend Inbal was laughing and saying, "My mother won't call me because she doesn't think it's a big deal!" Our parents automatically assumed we were in danger because the way they see it, Israel's so small that when there's trouble in one area, there's trouble everywhere. Israelis, however, know that this is not the case.

For Israelis who live in Jerusalem like Inbal and her family, these are tough times, but life must go on. I have been corresponding with Inbal since I returned home. When the cease-fire was called, I asked her what she thought about it. "I love [to] live in Israel because whenever something happens we all feel like brothers and that we all need to support each other," she replied.

When tragedy strikes in the United States, it's hard to really feel a sense of unity because the country is so big and we can't find a common ground. When Israel is attacked, the citizens are unified and have a fierce sense of pride for their country and their soldiers. No matter where in the world we are, we as Jews can unify and stand for Israel, because, as Inbal says, "The Jews are like a big family."
