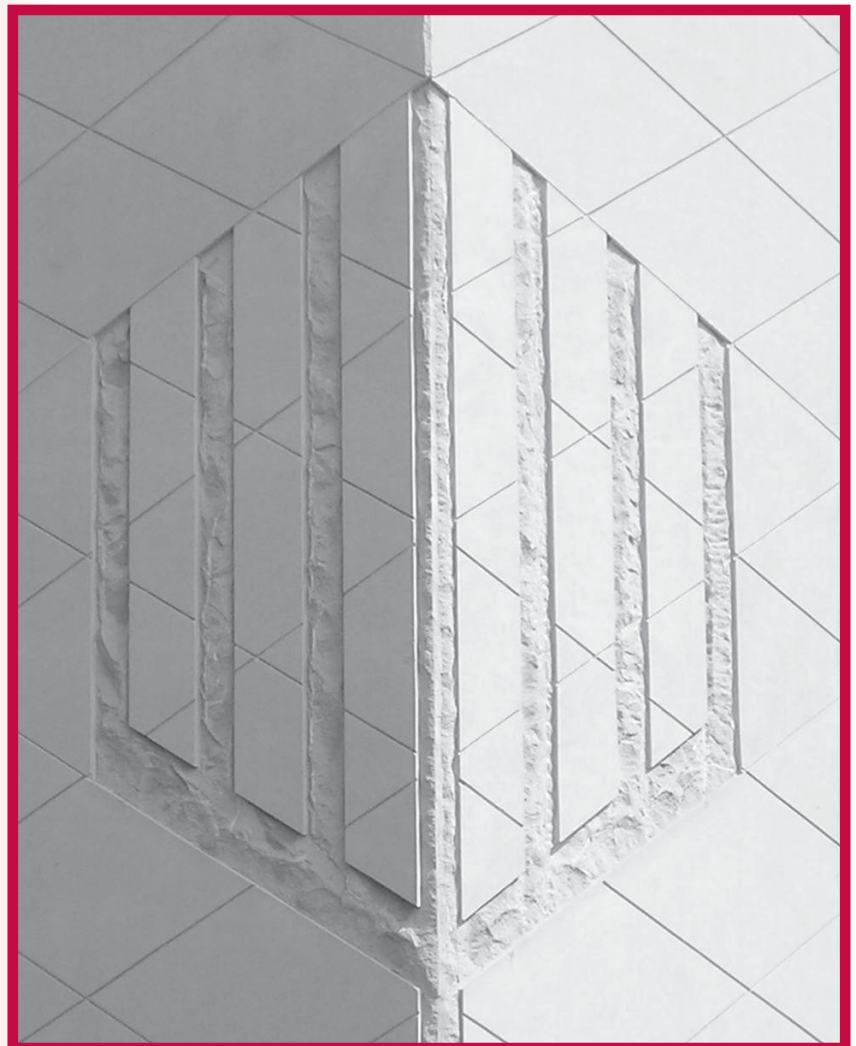

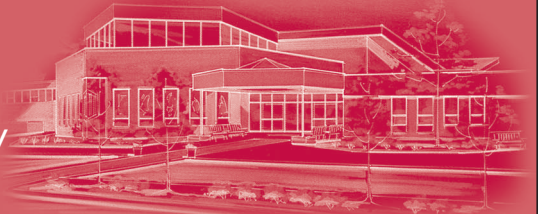

From Rabbi Zinkow's Annual Meeting Address

Temple Israel has had a wonderful year, and although it would stand to reason after 12 months of growth we might be fatigued, in truth, I feel the opposite. I feel fresh, renewed, inspired as we conclude our formal year and lift our eyes toward the next. I am excited and optimistic because as a community we have achieved some noteworthy successes this year that we should celebrate.

We recruited an extraordinary staff that enjoys coming to work, loves working together and has created a workplace that is welcoming, open and refreshing. We anticipate another productive year with them. However, we are sad that our talented and kindhearted Communications specialist, Brian Paris, and his wife Shahna will be moving; Shahna has accepted a position in the Anthropology Department of East Carolina University. We congratulate her on her PhD, and wish her (and Brian) an easy and healthy delivery.

I cannot speak highly enough about the professional team at Temple Israel. Rabbi Emily Rosenzweig, ordained exactly one year ago, has embraced her emerging rabbinate with great energy and maturity. The success of our Shabbat Synaplex programming is a reflection of her skills and vision. No one is more suited to run our school than Julie Makowsky, our educator. Julie and her family moved to Columbus last summer, and we were blessed that she chose us as her canvas upon which to express her creativity as a Jewish educator and her passion for helping children see the world through Jewish eyes. We near the end of two years of our Artist-in-Residency program, and I am pleased that our partnership with Danny Maseng, a world-class talent and teacher of Jewish music and Torah continues, with gratitude to our funders. Danny has raised the bar for this congregation, teaching us about how heart and soul are touched when word and melody are wed with artistry. Bryan Zive completes our music program. We have raised Bryan, after a fashion, from his days as an undergrad at OSU, and we were lucky enough to convince him to stay in Columbus. Bryan stayed here because he loves our kids and

wanted to help them grow up loving being Jewish, because he loves being Jewish and expresses it by teaching Judaism to children through music. I have said many times before that the mark of a healthy congregation can be seen in the vibrancy of its worship. We have gotten very healthy, and have even healthier tomorrows toward which to look. Elaine Tenenbaum, our executive director is a consummate professional, working with innumerable congregants to help them plan life-cycle events, with the board, committees and the auxiliaries to support their hard work, with vendors and caterers, and supervising our support staff. Elaine is loyal, dedicated and she loves Temple Israel as a parent loves a child. Becky Schedler and Judy Shepler continue to be delightful co-directors of our pre-school. Finally, we bid farewell to Katie Kurtzman, our youth director, who will be pursuing a career in nursing, so true to her character as a kind and generous young woman. Katie has been with the congregation for several years, and has grown up herself even as she has guided our high schoolers. We wish her every success.

Before I turn to our program, I wish to add a personal note of gratitude to my wife Rabbi Elka Abrahamson. Elka is my perpetual well-spring of wisdom, ideas and inspiration, and we all benefit deeply by her involvement as my partner and teacher.

This year, we undertook several initiatives on which I will touch briefly. We recruited Kurt Malkoff, a member of the congregation, CEO of Matrix Systems and well-respected psychologist to hold open-ended conversations with the parents of our religious school children. About 100 people took part in the dialogues, which were built around the question, "how can we, the Jewish institution with which you have cast your lot, help you craft an ideal Jewish journey for your household?" We learned how they have a vision of integrating worship with learning, about informal and intergenerational experiences, and more. We found out how important Jewish camping, youth grouping, Hillel and Israel trips are to the shaping of strong and lasting Jewish identities.

Our research results agree with research done by experts all over the country. So this year we

experimented with Synaplex, another initiative that we believe helps achieve the collective yearnings we heard about. Synaplex is a national project of the STAR Foundation, which stands for Synagogue Transformation and Renewal. The guiding principle of Synaplex is that we should put Shabbat at the center of our week, and think about Shabbat in the most expansive way. Namely, what if we could have streams of people, young and mature, coming into Temple Israel for all kinds of reasons (like they do on Sunday mornings), but in Jewish time, on Saturday morning, when they can experience the majesty and sanctity of Shabbat, while learning, or praying, or doing art, or singing, or cooking, or having a conversation about how to raise a mensch? That's a vision I have for Temple Israel - a community that truly engages with the rhythm of the Jewish week and through which we experience the weekly joy and responsibility of being a Reform Jew. Our program is a pilot program for the Union for Reform Judaism's reclaiming Shabbat initiative, which Rabbi Eric Yoffie will introduce at this year's URJ Biennial in December.

Immediately after the Biennial, about twenty Temple members will travel with Elka and me to Israel for a twelve-day Israel encounter. I believe that the best way to strengthen our ties with the Jewish people and our national homeland is to walk the streets and alleyways of our people's history and destiny in our precious State. Here, we celebrate 160 years of congregational life. The Jewish people celebrates 60 years of modern Statehood, and our sacred obligation is to participate actively in the rebirth of the Jewish people in our ancient land.

I want to emphasize that your Board of Trustees is a group of dedicated, faithful, thoughtful, caring and passionate individuals. They are ably led by Brian Tuckerman, your president and Ted Smiley, your vice-president. A shining example of the board's and a tremendous core of volunteers' dedication to the temple was their presence on May 7th at the annual Nehemiah Assembly of B.R.E.A.D.

It is through relationships within our community that we kindled the spark of social

justice, and it is on relationship and community-building that we must focus even greater effort. Since last September, I have hosted circles of temple members in my office, who have come to share their personal stories with each other, their sacred Jewish journeys. One by one, we move around the circle, hearing tales of Holocaust survival and immigration, of small towns in Texas and Ohio, of growing up in Brooklyn or Monsey, of leaving and returning to Judaism, of choosing Judaism for a marriage, of Orthodox grandparents, of ostracism and anti-Semitism, and of the joys of belonging to a Jewish community like ours. Those hours of sitting in my office, surrounded by new and veteran members of this temple, have been some of the most gratifying of my rabbinate. They have been truly sacred moments of connectedness, of hearing the journey of an entire people through the voice of one individual. I am so grateful for the opportunity to be let into your lives, and I am awed by your presence in my company. As a rabbi, central to me is the role I play in bringing people closer to God through their relationship with a Jewish community. May God bless me with humility and wisdom in this endeavor, and may the Holy One bless our congregation with health in its 160th year.

Religious School: End of the School-Year Address

Summertime... In the world of education this season is seen as a time to look back on how the year went and time to look forward and plan for the coming school year. For many teachers and educators it is also a time of professional development and a chance to recharge our batteries. This summer I plan on doing both as I participate in the Columbus Jewish Federation's Community of Learners at the Pardes Institute Seminar in Jerusalem, Israel.

As I think back on my first year with Temple Israel I feel very good about the accomplishments of the year. We have worked hard in the arena of professionalizing the school through developing systems of communications between parents, teachers and madrichim. The Thursday weekly email has given us a chance to keep families up to date about our programs. We plan to continue to improve upon this mode of communication in the coming year. Please make sure to provide an email address at the beginning of next school year to be included on our list!

Another significant effort this year was the new re-enrollment/registration system. After a record year of "first day" registrants we realized that a new system would be required in order to appropriately hire staff and

purchase curricular materials and supplies. Our new policy also helps consolidate financial planning for Temple families and allows everyone to enjoy summer without worrying about mailing in new forms. We are now months ahead in planning for next year compared to where we were last year.

Synaplex Shabbat was another new initiative that brought students and their families into Temple on Shabbat morning to learn and pray together. Our last Synaplex of the school year (held on the Shabbat of Mother's Day Weekend) allowed us to give *Kavod* (honor) to our Biblical mothers and female ancestors with Torah study through art, drama, plants, writing and games throughout the entire school. Please make sure to mark Synaplex dates on your calendar in August - these are special Shabbat mornings for you and your children to participate in prayer and learning.

I'm very excited to continue to meet the challenges of making our Religious School program one of excellence and relevance. In the coming year 3rd to 6th grade students will be learning Hebrew using our *Mitkadem* program on Sundays as well as on Tuesday or Wednesday. Sunday classes will begin 9:30 AM to allow families time to join as a community over the Brotherhood Bistro as

well as for Youth Choir to practice at 9 AM every Sunday. Our classes will join together for Havdalah services to explore the meaning of creating this sacred time in the community with family. We are also lucky to have the new Israeli Shlichah, Noa Ohayon as a temporary member of our faculty.

The more I think about it the more excited I get about returning to Columbus to begin making these plans a reality. I look forward to getting to know everyone in our community even better. You have all been so welcoming of my family and me to the Columbus area. Have a great rest of the summer and I will see you soon - *L'hitraot!*

Bev Darwin has been a member of Temple Israel since 1995 and has been very active in all aspects of Temple life. She served on the Board from 2003 to 2006, and most recently has been Social Action Chair for the past two years. Her involvement with Temple social action projects has stretched over many years, beginning with mentoring at Main Street Elementary School nine years ago, and now serving as coordinator of Temple Israel's current mentoring program at Kae Avenue Elementary School. She has chaired the Sisterhood Cooking for the Homeless Program for the past 6 years, preparing and serving lunch 6 times a year to over 200 individuals at Faith Mission. In 2003, she chaired Temple's Israeli Art Show and Sale to help raise funds for Temple. Following Hurricane Katrina, she spearheaded the Temple's Adopt A

Home Project to furnish a home for a family that had relocated to Columbus. Two years ago, Bev initiated Temple's Annual Flu Shot Program to keep our congregation healthy during the winter months. She serves on the Temple's BREAD core committee to address injustice in the greater Columbus community.

Outside of Temple Israel, Bev has chaired a number of fundraising events for community non-profit organizations. She co-chaired the Bexley Education Foundation BRAVO event in 2004 and co-chaired the YWCA Woman to Woman Luncheon for nearly 1000 women in both 2005 and 2006. A board-certified dermatologist, Bev worked the past three years at the Physician's Free Clinic, ending this past December to begin full time classes at CCAD to pursue a BFA degree. Her inspiration for her volunteer activities has been the support of her husband, Bob, and sons Ross and Evan.

Volunteering and serving others has been a constant in Marci Delson's life since she was 15 years old, when she volunteered at what was then General Hospital in Cincinnati. The 4-hour, twice-a-week activity sparked her interest in Nursing and led her on her life's course. She currently holds the position of Uniongram Scribe and serves as a Sisterhood Mentor to one of the Sisterhood Vice-Presidents.

Marci had the pleasure of being nominated to the WRJ Central District Executive Board as the Recording Secretary and formerly served as the Corresponding Secretary. She been blessed with the most accepting of husbands, Larry, who understands Marci's need to serve others even when it means dinners without her. Her children, Lisa and Adam grew up volunteering and recognize the importance of giving of themselves. "Volunteering is a two way street," Marci says. "It helps others and completes me."

160th Anniversary Celebration

"We celebrate ourselves and sing ourselves...for every atom belonging to me as well belongs to you."

-Walt Whitman, *Song of Myself*

On May 18, members gathered to celebrate a special anniversary ~ 160 years of Temple Israel's vibrancy in the Columbus community. From small beginnings as a shtetl from Germany, the congregation grew to become a multi-faceted microcosm of American Reform Jewry.

We celebrate ourselves! The Legacy Committee, chaired by Rita Cohen, worked for a year to produce A Walk Through History exhibit which made its debut on May 18, featuring photos and recollections of 52 long-time members as well as "story boards" of the various eras along the timeline continuum.

We sing ourselves... or rather, Danny Maseng, our Artist-in-Residence, skillfully performed a retrospective of Jewish Music Through the Ages following the gala Shabbat dinner.

Those who flee, leave behind most if not all of their possessions, including clothing. As they prepare to leave Choices' temporary shelter and embark on a new life, luggage is among the many things they are unlikely to have or afford.

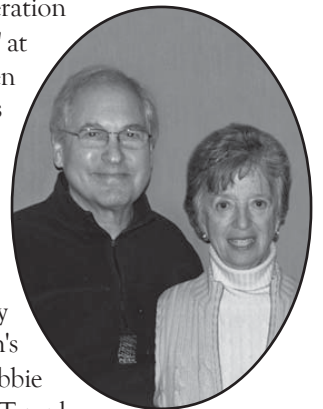


The Lichtensteins recall a Saturday in 2006 when they sat in the Sanctuary and witnessed their grandson, David Lichtenstein, becoming a Bar Mitzvah. "You have no idea," said Irv. "It's very soft and emotional." David and his father, Jeffrey, had the same Maftir (Torah portion).

Irv and Mitzi have witnessed their four grandchildren experience this rite of passage, and Jeffrey's daughter, Anna, will be the latest as part of the 2007 Confirmation Class. The Lichtensteins are proud to share in the next generations's growth in Judaism. Married in 1947 after Irv returned from World War II, after being "pinned" (engaged to be engaged), Mitzi spent most Shabbats before their marriage in Temple surrounded by friends who helped her pray for Irv's safe return. Today the couple enjoy attending services and say, "We're very happy with our association with the Temple and we look forward to being members for the rest of our lives."

When Nancy married Tom Lurie, a third generation Temple member, she too became a "regular" at Temple.

For the Luries, Temple Israel has "always been about the total package: a warm collection of friends and a beautiful place to socialize and worship." When Tom thinks back to his childhood at Bryden Road Temple, he says, "I remember the wonderful wood carvings and beautiful stained-glass windows, which were removed and then re-installed in our Chapel." He also says, "You knew everyone." Nancy became active in Sisterhood and attended with Tom's grandmother, Bessie and his parents, Ben and Bobbie Lurie. Both Tom and Nancy have served on the Temple Board of Trustees and Tom has served on the Temple Israel Foundation Board as well. Nancy and Tom also chaired the Couple's Club in the 1970's, and Nancy chaired the Art & Beautification Committee. The white High Holy Day Torah covers were donated by the Lurie family to honor their parents.



Belle Ungar and her husband, George, moved to Columbus in 1954. Belle knew she always wanted to open a furniture store, and so the family did - Functional Furnishings on North High Street, which ran straight through the 1990s. Belle was involved with a Sisterhood project that involved visiting prisoners at the Chillicothe Correctional facility once a month. "They were a whole bunch of girls who went down there; they'd bring toiletries and sometimes cookies and there was music and we'd dance with the guys. This was only for the Jewish prisoners." She recalls "a Mrs. Stern, a woman in her

late 70s jitterbugging with the prisoners. We used to laugh all the way home. She was such a good sport." Belle is proud of both of her sons, Matt and Jeff who became B'nai Mitzvah and were committed to Judaism. In 2004, Jeff served as Temple president. "He loved it," she said. And, Mom was very proud.

Social Action

Temple Israel and B.R.E.A.D. Rise Together

Close to two thousand people - members of churches and synagogues across Columbus - crowded into Temple Israel last month to urge our public officials to walk in the ways of justice.

On May 7, Temple Israel hosted the annual Nehemiah Assembly of the BREAD (Building Responsibility, Equality, and Dignity) organization. Forty-four worship communities - Jewish, Protestant, and Catholic - sent representatives to show their support for BREAD's initiatives for the coming year. In particular, BREAD will be pursuing state legislation to cap the payday lending rates of an industry that many think preys on the poor. In addition, BREAD will be seeking to restore state funding for health care for the working poor.

This past year BREAD was instrumental in establishing a model truancy reduction program that will begin in the Columbus Public Schools this coming fall.

Ninety-two members of Temple Israel attended the BREAD Assembly, demonstrating our commitment in Torah to pursue justice. Our numbers help show our political leaders the strength of BREAD's efforts.
