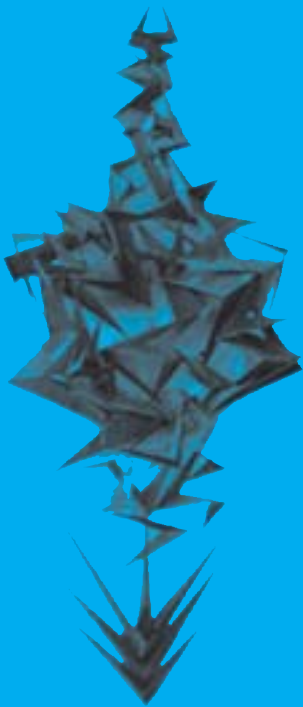

ACCESSING DIVINITY THROUGH TORAH... AND THE INTERNET



On the seventh of this month, we begin the second of our three-part *V'ahavta* adult education series that explores the subject of modern Jewish spirituality and introduces us to the many pathways of accessing the Divine in our tradition. In the fall, we explored the pathway of *Avodah* - worship. In this session, we look at accessing the Divine through the pathway of *Torah*, the study of our tradition's sacred text. Introducing this subject on February 7 is Rabbi Tzvi Tuchman, Director of the Columbus Community Kollel. He is a wonderful teacher who knows how to engage people in text. For anyone with even the slightest interest in this subject, this is a class you do not want to miss!

But all this talk about Torah study begs the question—"Why is the study of Torah so important in our tradition?" It seems like such an obvious, and maybe even an unnecessary, question to ask. The answer should be obvious to us. Yet, for many of us it is not. We've forgotten (or perhaps never learned) why it is so valuable. Often, we speak about Torah study, giving it our best lip service, but never really experiencing it. Yet, ask anyone who has ever engaged in *Torah l'shma*—Torah study for its own sake—and they will likely share with you how that experience lifted their spirit, enriched their lives, and spurred new friendships. They might even share with you how exciting it is to engage in discussions on contemporary issues that, in fact, were the same issues for the rabbis of the past. When our sacred text is studied, *Torah l'shma*—for its own sake—it will often raise our ordinary days to the heights of holiness that we would never have expected.

In an article on the historic importance of Torah study (available at myjewishlearning.com), Ron Isaacs writes, "Torah study was encouraged not only to sharpen one's mind but also to serve as a guide for living a moral life. The logic goes this way: One who takes Torah study seriously will most likely choose the right path in life. For this reason, the mitzvah of Torah study outweighs all other commandments."

The rabbis of the Talmud wrote, "These are the things for which a person enjoys the dividends in this world while the principal remains for the person to enjoy in the world to come. They are honoring parents, loving deeds of kindness, and making peace between one person and another, but the study of the Torah equal to them all" (Talmud Shabbat 127a)...because it leads to them all.

Today, there are hundreds of computer programs that one can buy to study Torah and Talmud. There's even a CD made to teach one how to chant Torah, should you want to learn. I am forever amazed at how many web sites are designed for the purpose of Torah study. Virtually everything you need is on the web. You could really do your own home study and spend the whole day reading different commentary on the weekly Torah portion. One site I highly recommend is, www.shamash.org. It is a site that links you to other web sites like www.urj.org, the web site for the Union for Reform Judaism and www.myjewishlearning.org.

Yet with all that is available, few people ever access it with regularity. It doesn't have to be that way. Temple Israel is working to change that trend through opportunities like *V'ahavta*, our Adult Education series, Lunch-and-Learn, and morning classes at Cup O' Joes. We will continue to bring Torah study to you.

In the past, it was more difficult to study this material and congregants relied solely on their rabbis to dispense such knowledge, as if we were keepers of the key. I suppose I should be a bit upset that so much is available to you because it makes my job that much harder. But, I'm not. Rather, I'm excited about the possibilities. Now, because of the the online availability of our sacred text, we can extend our reach beyond our wildest imagination, in our effort to access The Divine.

Kein y'hi ratzone – May it come to be.

TZEDAKAH OF THE MONTH

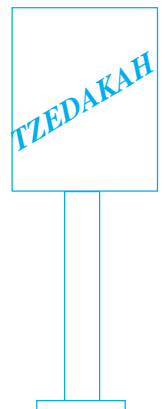

TSUNAMI RELIEF DONATIONS

Temple Israel is supporting the Asian tsunami relief efforts of MAZON: A Jewish Response to Hunger. MAZON has established a Relief Emergency Fund, based on requests from donors who know that MAZON's vast knowledge of the emergency food system and extensive history with proven grantees will be beneficial in this region.



The funds collected will be used to assist the International Medical Corps (IMC) in its efforts to bring desperately needed food and potable water to survivors left stunned by the quake and tsunami, which together are believed to have killed more than 200,000 people across an area extending from Asia to the eastern coast of Africa. That number could still grow once all the bodies are recovered, according to the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies.

IMC has worked in Indonesia since 2000 providing emergency and primary health care and mental health programs. IMC initiated an immediate response in Indonesia, drawing upon their existing capacity and expertise. They have sent a rapid assessment team to Aceh on the northern coast of the island of Sumatra. They are mobilizing additional teams of doctors, water and sanitation engineers, logisticians, nutritional experts to address the specific needs identified by the assessment team. They are coordinating with all appropriate international and national disaster response authorities to ensure that effort and vital resources are not duplicated or wasted. IMC has been a long-term MAZON grantee in various other venues of the world. MAZON has cultivated a fantastic working relationship and trust with the IMC and feel given the situational advantage that they are already in Indonesia and it will be easier to "ramp-up" operations. LEARNING ABOUT JEWISH BURIAL

"To everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heavens...." - Ecclesiastes 3:1

At a time of loss and vulnerability, or when pre-planning a funeral, our members have choices for themselves and their loved ones. Temple Israel offers two settings for burial: traditional and garden. In both settings, Temple Israel Cemeteries provide professional, perpetual care for all grounds and facilities.

Temple Israel Cemeteries are managed cooperatively by the Temple Israel Foundation, created in 1969, and Temple Israel. In 2000, the Foundation secured new space on grounds adjacent to cemeteries of other synagogues at Alum Creek and Performance Parkway. This cemetery offers a familiar design with traditional gravestones and markers for individual plots. Some families will prefer to reserve "family plots," which will accommodate four or more family members. Each family setting is set apart from other plots by landscaping and a larger memorial stone featuring the family name, creating a distinctive setting for future generations to visit.

The contemporary feel of Forest Lawn Memorial Gardens, located close to the temple just east of I-270, resembles a peaceful garden, a naturally scenic view uninterrupted by markers and gravestones. NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT

The Temple Israel Nominating Committee has been meeting since January to develop a slate of officers and trustees to be submitted to members in the March bulletin. Election of officers and trustees will occur at the Annual Meeting, date to be announced. Per the Constitution (Sec. 4.03-1 - Nominations), "Additional nominations for trustee or for any office may also be made by the petition of fifty members of the Congregation, which must be delivered to the Secretary of the Congregation before March 1. THIS MONTH'S COVER: In the West, we keep time by the Gregorian calendar, a modification of the Julian calendar and named for Pope Gregory XIII in the 16th century. This "Gregorian" year has 365 days, and every four years, an extra day is added to adjust the calendar to the actual solar year of about 365 ¼ days. The Jewish calendar, about a millennium older than the Gregorian one, is primarily lunar, but is a hybrid that makes adjustments to keep it in sync with the solar year. The first day of every Jewish month is a festival, called *Rosh Chodesh*, the New Moon; "chodesh" has the same root as "chadash," the Hebrew word for "new," with special liturgy added. The onset of Jewish months coincides with the appearance of the new moon, the "molad," or, the "birth of the new moon," which occurs with each revolution of the moon around the earth, every 29 days, 12 hours, 44 minutes, 3 ½ seconds. Because months are counted by days, not hours, it is necessary to add a half a day to one month or subtract half a day from the next. Consequently, the Hebrew months alternate between 29 and 30 days. A year on the Hebrew calendar consists of 12 lunar months.

Now, just to complicate matters, the 3 Pilgrimage Festivals of Pesach, Shavuot and Sukkot follow the solar cycle, and they must take place in their proper season, which is determined not by the moon's orbit around the earth, but by the earth's orbit around the sun. When we add up the days of 12 lunar months, we get about 354 1/3 days, while the solar year is roughly 365 ¼ days, or about eleven days longer. Without any adjustments, the Festivals would eventually fall in the wrong seasons. To prevent this occurrence, the calendar is regularly adjusted to ensure that the holidays fall "when they are supposed to fall." What is that "regular" adjustment? Get ready for this: a second month of Adar ("Adar Sheni" or Adar II) is added in the 3rd, 6th, 8th, 11th, 14th, 17th and 19th year of every nineteen-year period.

In the 7 years when there is Adar II, Purim is celebrated in Adar II. Simple, no? Now you understand why the holidays are never early or late....they are always "on time."

President's Report

Jeff Ungar, president, thanked **Rabbis Elka Abrahamson** and **Misha Zinkow** for hosting the Board in their home. The January Board Retreat will replace the January Board meeting. **Joseph Kohane**, Executive Director of OSU Hillel, will be the Retreat facilitator.

Board Retreat

Michael Mozenter introduced **Joseph Kohane** who has been working with the Retreat Committee for the past 4-6 weeks. The Retreat will "launch the ship for new directions." **Jeff** hopes the Retreat will result in a "template for 2005." Group Discussion: Roles & Responsibilities of Temple Israel Board Members, Functions of Congregational Trustees and a Mid-Year Self-Assessment for Temple Board Members were emailed to the Board. **Susan Schubert** and **Rabbi Zinkow** addressed how these forms would become the springboard for small-group discussions that would then report back to the whole. Discussion groups focused on members' board experiences, roles and job descriptions of board members, the work of committees, creating community within the temple, and being a welcoming congregation. Additionally, **Roger Sugarman** pointed out two special asides: 1) operationally, temple is fiscally sound; and 2) temple secured **Rabbi Zinkow**. "These are not accidents," he stated.

Rabbi's Report

Rabbi Zinkow reported on a group meeting that was held regarding an Israel Trip for June 2006. The trip will be geared toward first-timers as well as veterans, grown-ups and young people Bar/Bat Mitzvah age and older. Temple will be making a presentation to 2nd Harvest Food Bank on behalf of MAZON. This will be the touchstone for a temple-wide *tzedakah* program whereby a *tzedakah* box, designed by **Harvey Schwager** and **Fred Walkover**, will be placed in the Atrium, allowing members to contribute to a recognized charity each month. January's charity will be MAZON.

Finance

Harriette Hansell, Treasurer, reported "we have the system down so we can email financials to the board in a timely way. The numbers are looking good."

Personnel

Paul Greenland met with Support Staff (non-exempt) to discuss the timekeeping system that will be put in place on January 1, 2005.

Education

Ellen Mendel, Chair, stated that the second grade class has been split into two sections because of size. The Religious School turned over \$258 in *tzedakah* collections to the Federation's Annual Campaign at Super Sunday with the **Darwin** family making the presentation. The first installment of the Federation grant for Religious School of \$19,000 was received.

Family Education

Barry Lubow, Chair, reported that successful Tot Shabbat programs have been planned in conjunction with **David Lamden** and **Rabbi Brickner**.

Membership

Beth Silverstein reported that she has been calling the Prospective Member list. All new members since January '04 will be invited to a New Members Coffee at Rabbi Zinkow's home.

Nominating Report

Susan Schubert pointed out that, per the Constitution, the Nominating Committee has been formed, consisting of 9 members, not more than 3 of whom shall be voting members of the Board, and the remainder of whom shall be members in good standing of the Congregation. The Nominating Committee will hold its first meeting in January in order to comply with the timeline for announcing leadership to the membership prior to the Annual Meeting.

Transition Team Report

Susan Schubert reported on the December neighborhood events that have been held at the homes of the **Pollack's** in Westerville and at the **Tuckerman's** in Bexley. **Rabbis Zinkow** and **Brickner** welcomed prospective and new members, young parents and senior members, invited their participation at temple and encouraged their ideas.

Cantorial Search Report

Barbi Crabill, Chair, announced that the Search Committee recently met and reviewed 5 resumes and 4 cantorial recordings.

Executive Director's Report

Elaine Tenenbaum announced that monthly babysitting would begin, starting Friday, January 7 during services. Contracts have been signed with the following: TruGreen ChemLawn for the removal of 14 tree stumps at a discounted, end-of-season rate as well as a contract for prepayment of '05 lawn maintenance services at a 5% discount; service contract with The Trane Company to inspect, maintain and repair the HVAC system, consisting of 9 roof top units, 1 computer room unit and 18 PTEC units, 4 times yearly plus changing of filters; annual agreement renewal with Board of Elections for use of temple for general and special elections providing tenants pay liability insurance during time on premises. Awaiting insurance renewals ordered by Archer-Meek-Weiler as insurance package/umbrella and crime bond will be expiring.
