PRAYER

In November, our congregation takes the first tentative steps towards remodeling our prayer experience. Two events will occur simultaneously: experimenting with a new schedule of worship services AND experimenting with a new prayerbook.

As we have shared in last month's bulletin, our Friday services will (essentially) alternate between a 6:00 pm service and an 8:00 pm service. We hope this mixture of times will achieve two goals: allowing our members to worship together as one community, at times that meet our congregation's diverse needs. The actual schedule for November is printed on the next page. Please clip it out and save it for reference. The Shabbat and Holiday Committee values your opinion of this change. Try the schedule for a few months and give us your feedback. In the spring, we will use our experience to craft a standard schedule for Friday night services. Saturday morning remains at 10:30 am.

Our second change is more dramatic — and more long-term. When the small grey prayerbooks were printed, they were always intended to be interim prayerbooks, as a transition from the blue Gates of Prayer to a new book.

We now have the name of the new prayer - Mishkan Tefillah - and a date of publication - Spring, 2005. Beginning then, our congregation has voted to adopt the new prayerbook and begin using it as our major source for prayer services.

Temple Israel has been invited - and we have accepted - to be part of a pilot program to work with this new prayerbook. For the next three months - on Friday nights only - we will pray using an experimental edition of Mishkan Tefillah. Twenty-five members of the congregation have been asked to attend at least 8 of the next 12 services and complete a questionnaire. Their responses will help shape revisions to the final version of our movement's new siddur.

The Rothschilds – A Tony Award-winning Show!

Who Were the Rothschilds?

The most famous of all European banking dynasties for some 200 years, the Rothschilds exerted great influence on the economic and, indirectly, on the political history of Europe. The house was founded by Mayer Amschel Rothschild in Frankfort in the mid-1700's. The family name is derived from the red (*rot*) shield on the house in the ghetto in which Mayer's family had lived.

Though his parents had intended for Mayer to study for the rabbinate, his parents' early deaths forced him into an apprenticeship in a banking house. From this apprenticeship, Mayer became a dealer in luxury items and a trader in coins and commercial paper. Mayer & his five sons eventually became bankers for whom the French Revolutionary and Napoleonic Wars, of 1792 & 1815 respectively, became good fortune. His oldest son, Amschel Mayer, supervised the growing business in Frankfort, while Nathan established a branch in London in 1804, James (Jacob) settled in Paris in 1811, and Salomon Mayer & Karl Mayer opened offices in Vienna and Naples, respectively, in the 1820's.

In the second and third generations, there were frequent marriages between Rothschild cousins. The Rothschilds were much-honored. Mayer's five sons became barons of the Austrian Empire—one was the first Jew to enter British Parliament, and another was the first to be elevated to the British peerage. The head of the British branch has always been considered the unofficial head of British Jewry. Members of the British & French families – the only ones still engaged in banking after the seizure by the Nazis – have distinguished themselves as scientists and as philanthropists. Baron Philippe de Rothschild became a premier winemaker of the vineyard, Mouton-Rothschild.

News from the Hebrew Learning Lab

The Hebrew Learning Lab of Temple Israel is now in its third year! The great benefit of the Hebrew Lab to our students and parents is flexibility. Today's families face many demands on their time. In the Hebrew Learning Lab, parents and students pick the day and time that work best for them. In addition, the Hebrew materials are structured so that our students can work at their own pace, taking the time necessary to learn the Hebrew and moving ahead when they have completed the lesson.

The materials students use in the Hebrew Lab build upon previous learning and experience, moving the students to a deeper understanding of the Hebrew language and the meaning of the prayers. The curriculum uses the Hebrew prayers of the worship service as the primary vehicle to teach reading and comprehension. This is reinforced through the daily tefillah – a worship service lead by the students.

The Hebrew Learning Lab is a place of great energy and the learning of Hebrew, the language of the Jewish people. You are welcome to stop in and see the Hebrew Learning Lab in action (Mondays-Thursdays, 4-7 pm). 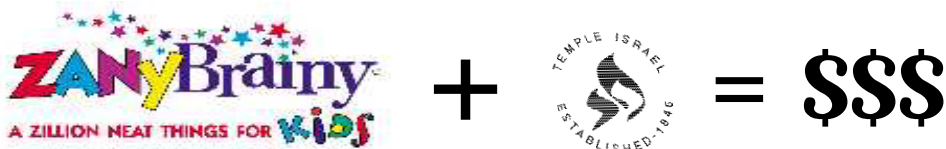

Mitzvah Mall is truly a "teachable moment" for adults and students alike. It provides meaningful alternatives to inexpensive Chanukah gifts, by offering students opportunities to decide how to spend the tzedakah monies they have collected in religious school this year. Each donation represents a specific Chanukah gift being purchased in honor of someone. All "gifts" cost between \$1-10 dollars. Participating organizations set up their displays to be both visual and tactile - no "gifts" are sold during the Mall. The Mitzvah Mall experience helps all participants, young and old, learn about the work of various community organizations, and realize that small donations can make a difference. First Steps: A BIG Program for Little People is a holiday-based program that meets on 5 Sundays throughout the year. It is geared for children ages 3-5 and their parents.

September 2002 Board Highlights

Membership The Membership Committee has been calling prospective members. The High Holiday Guest Ticket list was distributed so the board could identify individuals or volunteer to call them about membership. A letter was sent to in-town guests along with membership materials.

Finance Dues collection is ahead of targeted projections for 2002/2003. Monthly interest on the mortgage is \$9,900. The Rainy Day Fund currently stands at \$9,300 contributed by 15 donors as of 9/23/02. Steve Nacht will match the first \$10,000 contributed.

Fundraising "The Rothschilds" will be presented at the synagogue on Saturday, December 14. The cost will be \$18 for general admission; \$36 for a sponsorship, which includes special seating, listing in the program, and a sponsor dessert following the performance.

Shabbat & Holidays 60 people attended the Yom Kippur Break Fast. The single Erev Shabbat Service experiment—6:00 pm services on first and third Fridays—will begin in November. The CCAR will be publishing a replacement for the current gray prayerbook for spring 2005. The cost of these will be \$30 each, but if ordered by 12/31/02, there is a 40% discount. A recom-

mendation will be brought to the next meeting about purchasing. The CCAR is asking congregations to become a "beta site" for trying out an experimental version of the proposed prayerbook. Participating synagogues will have input into the new prayerbook. Temple Israel will look into this.

Facility Several building issues are being addressed: the replacement of recalled building sprinkler heads and the flushing of fire hydrants on our property in accordance with Fire Department regulations; and Load Occupancy signage, which is required for public spaces by the Ohio Building Authority. Signs will be made for each education room and public space. They will be affixed to each room at the entry point, as is required by the Fire Department. The concept of making the facility available for businesses, corporations, seminars and receptions is being pursued. A brochure will need to be developed.

Board Retreat The Board Retreat is planned for Saturday, December 7 from 8:30 am – 3:00 pm. Vivian Singer, a UAHC facilitator, will lead the session. The purpose of the retreat is to build affinity and leadership, to identify short-term goals, to define Temple Israel's customs (*minhag*), and to discuss how *minhag* is established.

Congregants are welcome to attend board meetings. All meetings begin at 7pm. The final board meeting of 2002 will be held November 26. If you have a question or topic that you'd like to have addressed, or would like a copy of the agenda, contact Susan Schubert (614-864-5111) or Elaine Tenenbaum (614-866-0010 x115). Temple Israel Cemeteries

Are you aware that Temple Israel conducts burials at three locations? The first location consists of two large sections of Greenlawn Cemetery - Section 44, opened for use in 1894, and Section 91, opened in 1929. The second location, across the street from Temple Israel at Forest Lawn, is a memorial garden setting (no headstones) which was opened in 1981. The New TI Cemetery at Alum Creek & Performance Parkway, is adjacent to the Jewish cemeteries of four other congregations, each with its own entrance gate. This cemetery was dedicated in 2001 as children of our Religious School assembled for the dedication and to bury discarded Jewish texts. The New Cemetery affords space for "family plots," four or more adjoining burial plots around which landscaping can be placed. The first interment occurred in this location last year. The earliest Jewish settlers in Columbus were laid to rest in land originally located near Children's Hospital. As the city of Columbus enacted zoning that required that cemeteries be located outside the city limits, Temple Israel purchased burial ground from Mt. Calvary Cemetery and those interred near Children's were moved to the Mt. Calvary location. Temple Israel still maintains the grounds of that one-acre cemetery, although no burials have occurred there since the early 1900's. Members are encouraged to consider purchasing burial plots on a pre-need basis to alleviate family stress at a time of sorrow. 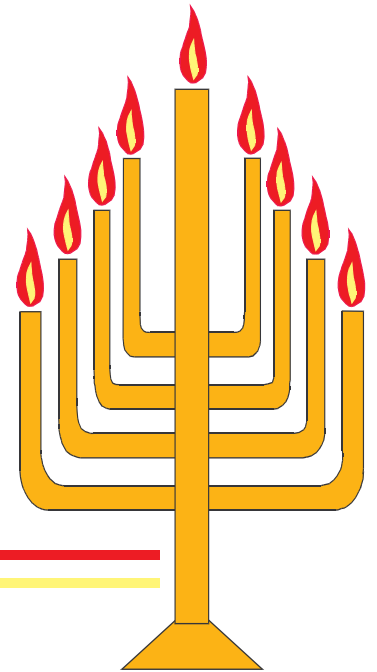
