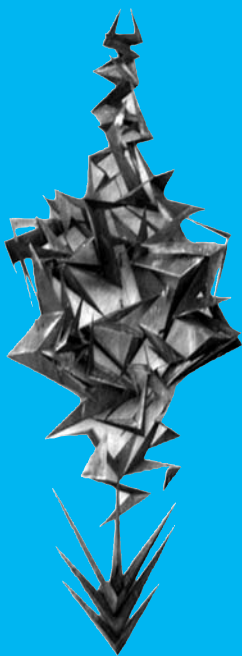

## LOOKING AHEAD



In the months ahead many of you will notice two things happening at the Temple. One is that on every level there is an increase in opportunities to get active. Opportunities for engagement with the temple will vary. For example, if you like to sing, consider joining the newly (re)established volunteer choir led by Danny Maseng. If your son or daughter likes to sing, consider signing them up for the Junior Choir that's starting up this year. More interested in traditional text study or studying current issues? Participate in any one of the many adult education classes and/or activities being offered throughout the year. (The Adult Education brochure listing the year's classes and special programs will be available at the Temple and handed out during the High Holy Days). Perhaps you've always wanted to become more socially active or see that the Temple becomes more involved in community concerns. If so, then join the Social Action Committee that is currently overseen by **Bev Darwin** and **Marci Delson**. They have worked throughout the summer to organize a viable and exciting program for the year, and more people are needed to make the program a success. Whatever your interest, there is something for you.

You will also notice appeals for critical human needs, from the Columbus Jewish Federation, MAZON and American Jewish World Service. In particular our help is needed to assist Israel to absorb thousands of Ethiopian Jews - see page 4 for details about Operation Promise. And you will be asked to continue to provide humanitarian aid to the people living in Darfur. I sincerely hope we are able to help all of these worthwhile projects to whatever extent we can, individually, as a family and as a congregation.

But, for now, I want to extend a different kind of appeal. It's not for money, but for time. As the new Jewish year begins, as Jews, we look inside ourselves and ask what's really important. The High Holy Day season is a time for getting back to basics. As we read in the *Machzor*, the High Holy Day prayer book, it's about *tefillah*, *teshuvah* and *tzedakah* – self awareness (prayer), forgiveness (repentance) and compassion for other (*tzedakah*). And, what's most important is that we don't try to do such introspection alone. The fulfillment of Judaism is found in the experiences shared in community. We do our best when we do things with others. Ironically, we become our best selves when we learn from and with others. So, my appeal: take time to reflect on what's most important to you and bring that to the temple. Find a way to share that value

with us in any one of the variety of ways we've created. Give us something of yourself. Engage with your congregation. Find value in your community.

May this year bring fulfillment to us all.

## OPERATION PROMISE: COLUMBUS COLLABORATIVE

Pledges to Help Rescue Ethiopians  
& Resettle Ethiopian-Israelis

Temple Israel representatives, **Artie Isaac, Aaron Shocket, Patti Shorr, Brian & Audrey Tuckerman and Rabbi Misha Zinkow** join 14 other Columbus Senior Congregational Rabbis and lay leadership as they embark on a 72-hour fact-finding mission to Israel.

The mission, called Operation Promise: Columbus Collaborative is taking on an exciting precedent, as each of our communities' senior rabbis and/or representatives from synagogues will join with Federation Campaign/Foundation leaders in traveling as a group to Israel to see first hand the needs of the ever-growing Ethiopian-Israeli community. Collaborative Mission participants will then bring the message of the Ethiopian community back to their congregations and to the Central Ohio Jewish Community.

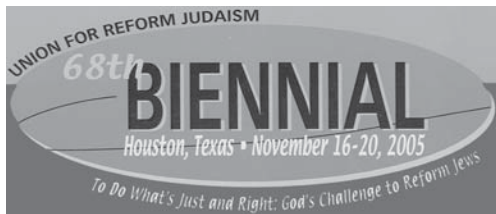
At the request of the Israeli Government, Operation Promise is a North American initiative designed to raise an additional \$100 million-over and above the funds raised in Federations' Annual Campaigns, to help bring the remaining 20,000 Falas Muras in Ethiopia, to Israel and to help mainstream the entire Ethiopian-Israeli community, and to give aide to Israel to help with the absorption of these immigrants. Columbus' fair share of \$1.1 million is payable over three years and is an addition to funds raised in the 2006 Annual Campaign.

The Columbus Jewish Community Leadership hope to engage the entire community in the Operation Promise Initiative. To that end, Operation Promise: Columbus Collaborative will be looking to the community for support. 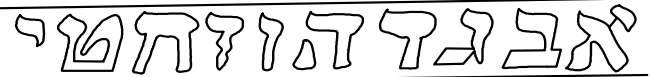

Lastly, we went to what used to be the synagogue and we heard the tale of how everyone killed each other so that they would die being free. It moved me hearing this piece of history. Before, Israel was an abstraction. We studied Israel and we followed the news coverage. If asked about Israel, we said the right words and even believed we understood, but we were wrong. Not until we met the people, saw the land, and experienced the indescribable feeling of walking through streets packed with Jews did we truly understand.

That understanding has changed us. Our daughter Rachel, who's beginning her college search, is suddenly very interested in the quality of campus Hillels and the availability of Hebrew and Jewish studies classes. She summed it up well when she said, “I used to wonder why people would take Hebrew as a foreign language. Why would anyone choose to learn Hebrew when there's only one country in the world where it's spoken? Now I understand. There may be only one country where they speak Hebrew, but it's MY country.” Israel is now real to our family; we have a connection to Judaism that we didn't know was missing until we found it. Our trip also had a positive impact on our connection to the Columbus Jewish community. Our experience opened our eyes to the many ways in which the Columbus community is involved in Israel. We established friendships with families who belong to other synagogues and live in other parts of Columbus. It struck all of us as a little ironic that one of the greatest benefits of traveling to Israel was making new friendships back home. To anyone considering a trip, our advice is: **GO.**

## S'lichot at the Drexel Theater

September 24 ~ 9 PM

The High Holy Days are preceded during the entire month of Elul with spiritual preparation to ready us for entering the New Year. For example, in the daily morning service (*Shacharit*), a few additional prayers of forgiveness (called *S'lichot*) are woven into the liturgy as a foretaste of the themes of *t'shuva* ("turning") and forgiveness that are central to Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. These themes come into sharp focus each year on the Saturday night before Rosh Hashanah (this year, September 24 a full week and a day before Erev Rosh Hashanah), Jews gather for special late-evening prayers that are considered the "gateway service" to the New Year. The service takes the name *S'lichot*, during which we savor a taste of the High Holy Day *nusach* (melodies) and contemplatively read words that evoke a sense of renewal and anticipation for the turning of the new year.

For our evening of *S'lichot* this year, we have planned a fascinating program. Through generous funding from donors **Tom and Nancy Lurie**, we have acquired one of the screens in the Drexel Theater, 2254 East Main Street in Bexley, and the film *Walk on Water*. Winner of three 2004 "Ophirs" (the award of the Israeli Film Academy), *Walk on Water* is by well-known Israeli director Eytan Fox, and stars Lior Ashkenazi, as well as an international cast including German and Palestinian actors. This thriller follows a second-generation Holocaust survivor and Mossad agent's mission to track down an aging Nazi officer. His mission brings him into contact with the Nazi's grandchildren and explores sensitive issues of Germany's past and Israel's present. This is a highly acclaimed movie that contains provocative themes of anger and revenge, of friendship, love and forgiveness, and of change and healing.

The program begins at 9 pm, with music and *S'lichot* service, followed by the movie. After the film, Rabbi Zinkow will moderate a discussion of the movie's themes as they relate to the coming Holy Day season with **Kurt Malkoff, Ph.D.**, owner of Kurt Malkoff and Associates, **Robin Judd, Ph.D.**, Assistant Professor of History at The Ohio State University, **Larry Moses**, President of The Wexner Foundation, and **Joseph Kohane**, Executive Director of Hillel at OSU. Malkoff is a leading psychologist, Judd a specialist in Jewish and European history; Moses and Kohane are children of survivors.

As the High Holy Days approach, the Temple Israel Babysitting Committee has been busy making plans for Temple Israel again to offer babysitting through a babysitting service. We found that the quality and reliability of the sitters to be excellent; their attention to children's needs to be exceptional; and we look forward to again having them in Temple Israel's employ.



As you may have noted in the High Holy Day newsletter sent to you several weeks ago, there will continue to be a **charge of \$5/child per service** for babysitting. This not only helps defray the cost of the many babysitters needed to accommodate the children on the High Holy Days but also allows Temple to better estimate the number of sitters to hire (based on the number of children and their ages).

One very important project of WRJ is the [Youth, Education, & Special Projects \(YES\) Fund](#). It represents the ongoing commitment to strengthen the institutions of Reform Judaism and support its future leadership. The Fund consists of individuals’ cash contributions as well as contributions made by the purchase of Uniongram items. Through the YES Fund, local sisterhoods help fund URJ high school and college-age youth activities and provide financial aid for North American rabbinic students on the three United States campuses of Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion. In addition, money from the YES fund goes towards making grants to special projects such as preschools in Israel.
